Course Description

The study of religion as cultural, social, and intellectual phenomena. The course teaches students how to interpret influential philosophical and theological theories. Students analyze aspects of religious systems-such as myth and ritual-across countries, regions, and ethnicities and produce a variety of writing assignments characteristic of the inherently interdisciplinary field of Religious Studies.

Course Objectives

An introduction to the various contemporary religions of the world with an emphasis on their historical development. Study of the basic beliefs in religions such as Hinduism, Buddhism, Sikhism, Judaism, Christianity, and Islam. (CSU/UC)

Objectives: 1. Demonstrate a basic understanding of Five main religions that are covered in the course.

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- 2. Demonstrate an ability to articulate ideas about religious issues.
- 3. Use philosophical methods, assumptions and principles to analyze philosophical ideas and positions.
- 4. Use critical thinking skills to evaluate the different beliefs of the main religions.
- 5. Understand the importance of religious iconography and religious ceremonies.
- 6. Analyze and evaluate the religious texts and their beliefs on ethics and free will.

In addition to the Paper and exams, there will be 4 quizzes, each is worth 2.5% of your final grade. There will also be a term paper (4-6 pages) assigned near the end of the semester. The specifics of the paper will be covered in class and are in Blackboard. Finally, a significant component of your final grade will be based on your participation in class. To do well in the class, you should do all of the reading assignments and group work in order to obtain you class participation points.
