## **Course Description**

This course will serve as an introduction to assessment and treatment approaches to alcoholism and drug abuse. Alcoholism will be studied in its social and clinical context. Attention will be given to the basic theoretical approaches to the disease. This course will examine the various components of intervention, treatment, recovery, and resources.

- 4. Demonstrate understanding of the major treatment models.
- 5. Demonstrate a working knowledge of local groups and the organizations offering treatment services.
- 6. Demonstrate an intervention in a family or workstation.
- 7. Demonstrate Professional readiness
- 8. Demonstrate understanding of screening and assessment the alcoholic/addict



- 9. Demonstrate treatment planning.
- 10. Demonstrate Counseling skills for individuals, group and family.
- 11. Demonstrate Professional and Ethical Responsibilities
- 12. possible causes or sources of developmental change and reasons for disturbances in the developmental process
