Course Description

A continuation of Art 124. Includes further development of the understanding of contemporary art issues and topics. Additional materials fee applies. (CSU, UC)

Course Prerequisite(s) and/or Corequisite(s)

Art 124, C or better.

Student Learning Outcomes

Upon course completion, the successful student will have acquired new skills, knowledge, and or attitudes as demonstrated by being able to:

1. Develop, create, and present portfolio of original paintings addressing contemporary art issues in a coherent personal style. (ISLO1, ISLO2, ISLO3, ISLO5)
2. Critique works of art. (ISO1, ISLO2, ISO3, ISLO4, ISLO5)
3. Write a descriptive essay on a contemporary artwork. (ISLO1, ISLO3, ISO5)

Course Objectives

Upon satisfactory completion of the course, students will be able to:

1. Acquire artistic skills and habits of thoughtful and expressive execution of artwork including paintings.
2. Execute a grisaille painting by first developing a gray, black and white composition, and adding translucent layers of pigment over the grisaille.
3. Visualize the human figure as a component and develop expressive representations that combine the form into a structured compositional painting.
4. Explore content through the incorporation of words or symbols.
5. Incorporate found objects in paintings.
6. Create a site-specific painting or incorporate the element of time into a piece.
7. Research contemporary artists to identify current art issues.



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8. Develop a personal style and body of work to be used for transfer to a four-year program or for employment in the art field.

Course Requirements and Instructional Methods

Course Overview: This is an intermediate course in oil painting. Under some circumstances, acrylic may be used. Ask your instructor. There will be lecture, demonstration, and audio-visual materials as well as painting and critiques (possibly both verbal and written).

Paintings must be completed on canvas in either acrylic or oil and must be original work completed during this semester for this class only, not another class or previous work done some time ago.

The class will be taught IN PERSON in Room 3700. The class is cross listed with the other levels of painting classes, including II, III and IV, which means you will get to see what others are doing and discuss their work with them.

Most everything you need will be supplied including the paint, canvas, brushes, palette and palette knife. Because you MAY be SOMETIMES working from home, we will be supplying water-soluble oil paint that needs no solvent for cleaning up. You may wish additional materials that you will need to purchase.

Instructor Expectations:

- **Students who do not attend the first day of class are automatically dropped. (Participation means attending class or contacting your instructor the first week.)**
- If you stop attending class, make sure to drop yourself from the class.
- Work is to be turned in on due date – no late work is accepted unless for good reason.
- You are responsible for knowing and observing due dates for all assignments.

What to Expect from your Instructor:

- Your writing assignment will be graded within one week from the due date.

Attendance and Participation:



- **You will earn 10 points for consulting your instructor during each class you attend. If you do not attend class, you are required to provide an update for each class to your instructor via email or Canvas inbox, text or phone.**
- **Understand that if you are not in communication with your instructor, you are not receiving any feedback, guidance or instruction, hence the requirement to stay in communication.**
- **You earn 30 points for each critique, however, you must attend the day of the critique, show your own work, be there for the entire critique from start to finish and share your ideas and feedback to fellow students. If you leave early or arrive late, you may lose points.**

Add/Drop Policy

If, after reviewing the syllabus and orientation, you feel this is not the right course for you, please let me know ASAP, so that you can be dropped from the course and another student can be added in your place.

Students who miss more than two graded assignments (discussions, critiques, etc.) may be dropped from the course. In addition, students who fail to log in to the course for 7 consecutive days risk being dropped from the course. If you are struggling, experiencing issues, or are seriously ill, please contact me when you are able so we can develop a success plan together.

Late Work Late work interrupts the flow of learning in this course and could cause serious problems. **Critiques are designed to be interactive--the feedback you give to and get from your peers is just as valuable as any feedback you will receive from me.** There is no way to make up a critique. Other types of late work may receive a 10% reduction in the grade unless there is an acceptable reason.

If an emergency arises, such as illness or a family emergency, please let me know when you are able. I can't reiterate enough that your success is my central goal, but your success also involves a partnership between you and me that is supported by strong communication.

Essay Grading Policy:

- The Essay is graded on a percent of 100.
- Grade reflects the overall quality of the work turned in, how complete the work is and whether the instructions from the assignment were properly followed.
- A rubric will be used to grade the essay.
- Missing or unsatisfactory work will be scored "no credit." This is a 0 (F) and averaged into your grade.
- Essays that do not follow the prompt instructions will receive a 0 (F).
- **Late essays are not accepted.**

Essays & Plagiarism:

- You will be writing one essay.
- **All essays will be turned into a plagiarism and AI checker. Turn off Grammarly. Don't use translation tools; you won't need them.**
- So that your essay is not cited for plagiarism or AI, the reports should be 15% or less.
- Any essay that is suspected of plagiarism will receive a zero.

Critiques:

- There are three critiques during the semester.

Out of Class Assignments: The Department of Education policy states that one (1) credit hour is the amount of student work that reasonably approximates not less than one hour of class time and two (2) hours of out-of-class time per week over the span of a semester. WASC has adopted a similar requirement. This class normally meets face-to-face for six hours per week.

Course Grading Based on Course Objectives

Your final grade will be composed of the following:

Midterm Portfolio (your paintings completed to Midterm): 305 points

Final Portfolio (your paintings completed after Midterm): 305 points

Updates on Assignments: 10 points per class X 15 weeks plus 1 during finals week (10 points) = 310 points

Essay: 200 points

Three In-Person Critiques. Attendance is mandatory. Each is 30 points X 3 = 90 points

Required consultations with instructor 10 points per class (twice a week) for 15 weeks = 300 points

Total possible = 1200 points

Critique Rubric:

Present for entire critique 10 points

Shares current assignment 10 points

Shares ideas and feedback to fellow students 10 points = a total of 30 points

Portfolio: The portfolio is a group of paintings, not necessarily held within some sort of folder. Paintings, as required from each assignment, will be graded as a group at Midterm and for Final at the end of the semester.

Required Midterm and Final Portfolio review: At the middle and end of the semester, submit digital photographs of your paintings to your instructor via email, Canvas messaging or by attaching .jpgs to the assignment in Canvas. You will receive a grade with comments and suggestions for all the work completed.

If you miss the Midterm or Final portfolio review, your grade may drop as a result of undocumented classwork.

Portfolio Grading Rubric - Portfolio Grades are based on four major factors:

- **CREATIVITY:** Is the work conceptually inventive? Was your painting resonant, gripping, inventive, or memorable? **(24.5% of grade) 75 points**
- **SKILL LEVEL:** Is the work convincing in terms of form, value and special effects? Is the painting well crafted? Has there been any development or improvement? **(24.5% of grade) 75 points**
- **SUBSTANCE:** How substantial is your learning process? Do you bring intensity, commitment, and energy to

class? (24.5% of grade) 75 points

- **COMPLETENESS: Is your work finished? (26.2% of grade) 80 points**

About the essay: Students are required to complete a 600–900-word written opinion, meeting specific requirements outlined in the assignment handout. It will be submitted to a plagiarism service on Canvas. Below are the factors on which it will be graded. **THIS ESSAY MUST BE WRITTEN IN FIRST PERSON. AN EXAMPLE OF THIS IS USING THE WORDS, “I THINK _____,” “I SEE _____” OR “I FEEL _____”, etc. THIS ESSAY IS NOT TO INCLUDE ANY BIOGRAPHICAL OR HISTORICAL INFORMATION.**

- A bag or something to keep everything in.
