- 2. Student will demonstrate a knowledge of Non-Harmonic Tones (passing tones, neighboring tones, appoggiuaturas, escape tones, anticipations, and suspensions) through sight-singing, keyboard performance, and written analysis.
- 3. Student will demonstrate a knowledge of four-part harmonization using primary and secondary chords in root performance, and wtitten analysis.
- 4. Student will demonstrate a knowledge of four-part harmonization using the dominate seventh chord in root position and inversion through sight-singing, keyboard performance and written analysis.
- 5. Student will demonstrate a knowledge of four-part harmonization using secondary dominants through sight-singing, keyboard performance, and written analysis.
- 6. Student will demonstrate a knowledge of four-part harmonization using modulations to closely related keys through sight-singing, keyboard performance, and written analysis.
- 7. Student will correctly notate rhythmic and melodic diatonic dictation.
- 8. Student will correctly notate harmonic (intervalic) dictation.
- 9. Student will correctly notate harmonic (triadic) dictation.
