Course Description

An introduction to music literature with emphasis on listening experience. Students study the expressive materials of music and the major forms of music literature including music of the Middle Ages, Renaissance, Baroque, Classical, and Romantic eras as well as 20th century, Jazz, American music, Rock, and Non-Western music. Emphasis placed on the skills and understanding necessary for lifelong music listening experiences. (C-ID MUS 100) (CSU, UC)

Student Learning Outcomes

1. Student will learn and use critical listening skills to discuss and critique a musical work. (ILO1, ILO2, ILO4)
2. Student will learn to identify all the instruments in an orchestra by their appearance and their sound. (ILO1, ILO2, ILO4))
3. The student will learn how identify the “form” of a classical or jazz composition through repeated listening. (ILO1, ILO2, ILO4))
4. Student will know the names of the most important Baroque composers and their most significant 2 compositions. (ILO1, ILO2, ILO4)

Course Objectives

Upon satisfactory completion of the course, students will be able to:

- Demonstrate a knowledge of the place of music within human society since prehistory.
- Demonstrate a knowledge of the materials of music (rhythm, melody, harmony, timbre, texture, and smaller forms-motive, phrase, sentence, period, one-part, binary, ternary).
- Demonstrate a knowledge of the larger forms of music (song forms, fugue, rondo, theme and variations, Baroque sonata, sonata-allegro, Classical sonata cycle, concerto, symphony, string quartet, etc.).
- Demonstrate a knowledge of the historical periods of traditional music.
- Develop skills as an active (as opposed to passive) listener appropriate to the study of music.

Course Requirements and Instructional Methods

Academic Expectations:

Full participation in this class is expected. Attendance will be taken at the beginning of each class period. If you arrive late, you must check in with the instructor to be marked present. Late Work Policy

Failure to do so will hinder your success. If you do not turn in your work, you will lose 1% of the grade for the assignment per day. Drop Policy

A student who fails to attend the first meeting will be dropped by the instructor as of the first official meeting of that class. Should readmission be desired, the student's status will be the same as that of any other student who desires to add a class. It is the student's responsibility to drop or officially withdraw from the class. Regular attendance in all classes is expected of all students. A student whose continuous, unexcused absences

Course Grading Based on Course Objectives

Preparation for Class:

You are required to log in to the Canvas virtual classroom, view a short article/page and answer a pre-class quiz to prepare you for our class activities. Each assignment is due before a new unit begins and is relevant to that unit's subject or era. Every student must complete the task whether he or she is present in class. It is necessary for the student to keep abreast of the timeline so that the work is completed on time.

Discussion Boards

Students will be assigned seven discussions throughout the semester to answer questions and creatively critique music and subjects presented in class. Each student is expected to submit a post to his or her assigned forum and respond to at least two other participating classmates. These discussions are to be held in class with a write-up of the sessions turned into our Canvas LMS site.

InQuizitive Listening Quizzes

The publisher has created some really interesting listening guides in the text and we will be using the "InQuizitive" music listening quizzes that are associated with the listening. There will be one assigned quiz per units 2-7 and they must be completed by the end of the unit as noted on our timeline. To access the quiz for the first time, you will need to log in to the e-book on the digital resource page. I have included a short video in Canvas if you need help. The quiz is worth 50 points total. The quiz will assign your score to you when you have completed the task and will be transferred to the gradebook.

Midterm and Final Exams

Paper exams are given, and students must be prepared and present to take the exams. Final exams will not be given at a different time than scheduled. No make-up for finals is allowed in this course unless previously discussed with the instructor. The midterm exam will cover the first half of the semester, and the final exam will only cover material after the midterm.

Grading

I will grade your work within one week of the due date. If I cannot achieve this, I will send out a message in Canvas or speak about it in class. If you have any questions or concerns about your grade, please check for feedback in the Canvas gradebook and speak with me about it personally.
