Course Description

ESL 014 is a listening and speaking course for ESL students who want to develop oral language and listening skills at the intermediate level. Students learn to comprehend extended spoken discourse and lectures, and learn to give explanations and opinions on a variety of common academic topics. This course may be taken concurrently with other Level 4 ESL courses. Successful completion of this course will prepare students for ESL 015. (CEFR B1) (Nontransferable, nondegree applicable)

Use generally accurate pronunciation, including intonation and stress; 2 6. Demonstrate knowledge of sufficient vocabulary to express ideas on most topics pertinent to everyday life such as family, hobbies and interests, work, travel, and current events

We will watch videos and lectures about different subjects, practice note-taking, study grammar, and work on our presentation and communication skills. There will also be a midterm and final oral exam. Videos, readings, pronunciation practice, and various assignments will be posted and submitted online. Out of Class Assignments: The Department of Education policy states that one (1) credit hour is the amount of student work that reasonably approximates not less than one hour of class time and two (2) hours of out-of-class time per week over the span of a semester. WASC has adopted a similar requirement. You should expect to spend 15 hours a week on this course
