# **COURSE DESCRIPTION:**

An in-depth study of the development, function and techniques of patrol, including: observation skills, development of intelligence, traffic control and preliminary investigative duties, handling complaints and requests for service, public and community relations and basic crime prevention. The mechanics of: field interviews, search and arrests, note taking and police report essentials. The student will also be given a familiarization with basic police equipment and the handling of community crime incidents.

# **COURSE OBJECTIVES (SLO):** Students will be able to:

- 1. Explain the historical development of United States law enforcement and the concept of patrol and beat responsibility.
- 2. Explain the function of patrol and the various techniques used to accomplish that task.
- 3. Understand the importance of developing good observational skills and demonstrate the proper utilization of what they observe.
- 4. Recognize the importance of developing intelligence on an area or group/individual and how this intelligence is used.
- 5. Recognize the importance of traffic control and enforcement, along with the techniques used to accomplish this task.
- 6. Recognize the elements of a preliminary investigation and the duties required of law enforcement personnel at a crime and/or critical incident scene.
- 7. Understand the importance of and how to handle a complaint, as well as requests for service.
- 8. Understand the importance of good public and community relations.
- 9. Explain what basic crime prevention is and how it relates to reducing criminal activity.
- 10. Explain the importance of and elements of a field interview and be able to demonstrate the basic techniques used.
- 11. Understand the elements of an incident, crime and arrest report and how proper note taking is essential to the accuracy of the information presented in them.
- 12. Recognize basic law enforcement equipment and its use in modern law enforcement.
