COURSE DESCRIPTION:

Through participation in this course, students will become familiar with the evolution of police community relations, its development throughout history, current practices, and future trends. Participating students will further understand the importance of building relationships and trust to establish effective partnerships in their communities and how these partnerships enhance an officer's problem solving skills through a collaborative effort.

COURSE OBJECTIVES:

- 2. Understand and develop the basic abilities required in community relations
- 3. Explain the importance and value of approaching public safety through a community policing philosophy
- 4. Identify the various types of crime prevention programs
- 5. Recognize the various opportunities to create partnerships and their essential function
- 6. Identify the importance and benefit of collaboration and problem solving
- 7. Understand and recognize the importance of positive, oral and written communication

Writing Assignment: You will be required to submit one investigative report prior to your final exam. The subject of your investigative report will be discussed and assigned in class.

Final Examination: Your final exam will cover the material discussed in lectures throughout the semester and found in your textbook's chapters.
