**COURSE DESCRIPTION:**

The course will cover the techniques of handling juvenile offenders and victims, prevention and repression of delinquency, diagnosis and referral, organization of community resources, juvenile law and procedures.

**EVALUATION METHODOLOGY:**

Your grade in this course is based on the accumulation of percentage points generated from the following: There will be two exams, a mid-term and a final examination. Each exam is worth one third of your grade (the lowest test score from the two exams will be dropped.) Therefore, the mid-term and final exams **MUST** be taken. Extra points can be generated by making oral presentations to the class. A maximum of 10 percentage (extra credit) points can be earned per student, per testing period.

**STUDENT LEARNING OUTCOMES:**

Upon completion of this course, the student will be able to:

**1<sup>st</sup> Outcome:** Examine the development of America's juvenile system from its inception to the present.

**2<sup>nd</sup> Outcome:** Categorize current juvenile problems and explain the juvenile system response to each of the problems.

**3<sup>rd</sup> Outcome:** Compare and contrast the organization and jurisdiction of local, state and federal juvenile justice system entities. Critique its differences and similarities.

**4<sup>th</sup> Outcome:** Explain how specific laws regulate the investigation, arrest, detention, and disposition of juvenile offenders and victims. Identify how the juvenile offender is processed through the juvenile system.

**GRADES:**

Grades will be based on the following percentages:
