Students who take this course will demonstrate:

- An understanding of what behavior deserves criminal punishment.
- An understanding and appreciation of the reasons for the limits on criminal law and criminal punishment in the U.S. constitutional democracy.
- The ability to identify the elements of, and to explain why, the voluntary act is the first principle of criminal liability.
- An understanding and appreciation for the fact that most *serious* crimes require criminal intent *and* a criminal act.
- Knowledge of the fact that the law of self-defense is undergoing major transformation.
- An understanding that defendants who plead an excuse defense admit what they did was wrong but argue that, under the circumstances, they were not responsible for their actions.
