COURSE DESCRIPTION

The course covers the historical development of law and constitutional provisions; definitions and the classification of crime and their application to the system of administration of justice; legal research, study of case law, methodology, and concepts of law as a social force are presented. Crimes against persons, property, government, and organized crime are discussed.

- 1. Identify the historical sources of United States criminal laws.
- 2. Demonstrate knowledge of the United States Constitution and other key documents of the criminal justice system.
- 3. Analyze and explain criminal appellate cases.
- 4. Compare and contrast the classifications of criminal law.

Individual Presentation (50 Points)

You must make an 8 minute oral presentation on a criminal justice topic of your choosing. You may use powerpoint or any other visual aid if you so desire. You must speak in a loud, clear voice and make eye contact with the class. You may include a short video clip but it will only count for up to 2 minutes of your time.

Grading Criteria:

Individual Presentation Comments (50 Points)

You must write 2-3 sentences commenting on each of your classmate's individual presentations.

Grading Criteria

You will earn 10 points <u>per presentation day</u>. You must comment on all presentations made. Presentations will be made on five separate dates.

Textbook Questions (40 Points)

I will assign four questions from the textbook throughout the semester. Due dates are listed in the syllabus.

Grading Criteria:

10 points per question. The questions shall be answered based on the information in the textbook.

Research Paper (50 Points)

You must submit a typed, three page, double spaced paper on a criminal justice topic of your choosing. The paper must be stapled, typed, 12 font and 1" margins all around. It cannot be the same topic as your individual presentation.

Grading Criteria:

Topic & Content = 25 points Spelling/Grammar/Punctuation = 15 points Following instructions = 10 points
