Student Learning Outcomes

Upon course completion you will be able to:

- 1 Compose a multi-paragraph essay that responds to an essay prompt with a clear controlling idea or thesis statement.
- 2 Compose a multi-paragraph essay with a clear organizational structure and adequate support.
- Compose a multi-paragraph essay that uses correctly formed sentences with virtually no sentence-level or grammar errors.
- 4 Develop a research paper that effectively synthesizes ideas and information from multiple sources and utilizes correct MLA formatting of citations.

Course Objectives

1. Develop and apply discovery techniques for expository writing with five or more multi-paragraph essays, including a mini research paper.

2. Design an essay plan based on concrete data in pre-writing exercises that produces a controlling idea or thesis statement.

3. Organize content to support a thesis statement and subsequent supporting paragraphs while studying and applying various rhetorical modes with emphasis on comparison/contrast, definition, cause/effect, and argumentation.

4. Demonstrate the ability to recognize and identify various audiences, both general and academic, focusing on academic audiences.

- 5. Synthesize ideas and information from multiple sources in the development of a writing assignment that is supported by citations from the reading.
- 6. Practice a variety of sentence types and demonstrate principles of effective sentence construction and punctuation, including correct use of the comma, semicolon, quotation mark, apostrophe, and parentheses.
- 7. Demonstrate an understanding of connotative meaning and figurative language in his/her own writing fter recognizing this technique in the writing of others.
- 8. Practice and successfully demonstrate the skills in areas designated by the instructor to be appropriate supplemental activities of improved writing technique.

Instructor Expectations

- You are to attend every class session, arrive on time, and stay for the duration of the session.
- Students who are absent the first day of class are automatically dropped.
- If you stop attending class make sure to drop yourself from the class.
- You must come to class prepared: textbooks, pencil, pen, highlighter, notebook, etc...
- Work is to be turned in on due date no late work accepted.
- Turn off cell phones while in class.
- You are responsible for knowing and observing due dates for all assignments.
- In this class you will be using blackboard to complete assignments, submit essays, and check your grades. It is important that you become familiar with blackboard.

Aplia Is required online homework that corresponds to the chapters in *Evergreen*. Access to Aplia is bundled with your text in the college bookstore and includes access to the corresponding e-book for free. If you don't buy a hard copy of *Evergreen* in the bookstore, you can purchase Aplia (along with an e-text of the book) from the website at <u>www.aplia.com</u>. If you prefer to use only the e-book and not purchase a hard copy, you must either print out each chapter we cover and bring it to class, or have your computer or electronic reader with you in class.

Grading

- No late work will be accepted under any circumstance. Class work and homework will be collected weekly.
 - o Note: Incomplete assignments automatically receive a zero.
 - If you are absent for a class meeting, you cannot make up the work that was completed in class.
- Exams are given regularly and may be UNANNOUNCED.
- If you are absent on the day of an exam you will have the opportunity to make up ONE exam during the semester.
- The final exam for this course is a common final. It is an in-class essay that should demonstrate your mastery of the writing skills that you have attained in the semester.

Essay Grading Policy:

• Papers are graded on a percent of 100.

- Grade reflects the overall quality of the work turned in, how complete the work is and whether the instructions from the assignment were properly followed.
- A rubric will be used to grade each essay.
- Missing or unsatisfactory work will be scored "no credit." This is a 0 (F) and averaged into your grade.
- Late essays are not accepted.

<u>Academic Misconduct Policy</u>: Academic misconduct includes misconduct associated with the classroom, laboratory or clinical learning process. Some examples of academic misconduct are cheating and plagiarism.

<u>Cheating</u> includes, but is not limited to, (a) use of any unauthorized assistance in taking quizzes, tests, assessment tests or examinations; (b) dependence upon the aid of sources beyond those authorized by the faculty member in writing papers, preparing reports, solving problems, or carrying out other assignments; or (c) the acquisition, without prmission, of tests or other academic material belonging to a member of the college faculty or staff.

<u>Plagiarism</u> includes, but is not limited to, the use of paraphrased or directly quoted published or unpublished work of another person without full and clear acknowledgment. It also includes the unacknowledged use of materials prepared by another person or agency engaged in the selling of term papers or other academic materials. Information gathered from the Internet and not properly identified is also considered plagiarism. Any student found by a faculty member to have committed academic misconduct may be subject to sanctions as determined by the faculty member. Sanctions MAY include a warning, grade adjustment, and course failure. Consequences for plagiarism include a zero on the assignment and a referral to Sergio Lopez, Dean of Student Development and Campus Events.

<u>Attendance Policy/Tardiness</u>: "A student who fails to attend the first meeting of a class MAY be dropped by the instructor immediately following the class. Regular attendance in all classes is expected of all students enrolled. A student may be excluded from further attendance in a class during any semester when absences after the close of registration have exceeded the number of class hours which the class meets per week. When you signed up for this class, you made a commitment to attend all sessions and complete all assignments, including reading lab work. However, if you know two weeks in advance that you will be absent from class, you may make arrangements with me to take the scheduled test (and submit that week's homework) one week early. You may not make up a test that has already been taken by the class. You may not submit late work.
