Course Description

This course aims to build reading efficiency to college level for graduation from IVC and/or successful completion of transfer level courses. Course work includes practice in whole chapter note-taking, vocabulary building, study reading, informed reading of literature, and reinforcement of critical thinking skills. Participation in instructor-assigned reading lab activities is a required part of the course.

Student Learning Outcomes

Upon course completion you will be able to:

- 1 Locate and analyze both stated and implied subjects and main ideas in paragraphs.
- 2 Locate major and minor details and identify the author's organization of ideas in expository paragraphs and simple essays.
- 3 Use context clues and word parts to analyze and learn unknown vocabulary.
- 4 Show growth in reading skills by attending and completing assignments (blocks) in the online reading lab program.

Course Objectives

- 1. Locate and analyze subjects and main ideas in paragraphs.
- 2. List supporting details and minor details in paragraphs.
- 3. Locate and classify common signposts or signal words in paragraphs.

4. Derive the meaning of words through analysis of context clues and word parts, such as prefixes, roots, and suffixes.

- 5. Present a written plan for a workable study schedule and explain orally or in writing a method of study.
- 6. Explain orally or in writing the codes or markings used in dictionary entries.
- 7. Analyze and solve problems with the use of graphs, charts, captions, and maps.
- 8. Demonstrate critical reading skills when analyzing assigned readings.

9. Summarize multiparagraph articles or stories as well as at least one single author text (200 pages minimum).

Instructor Expectations

- You are to attend every class session, arrive on time, and stay for the duration of the session.
- Students who are absent the first day of class are automatically dropped.
- If you stop attending class make sure to drop yourself from the class.
- You must come to class prepared: textbooks, pencil, pen, highlighter, notebook, etc...

- No late work will be accepted under any circumstance. Class work and homework will be collected weekly.
 - Note: Incomplete assignments automatically receive a zero.
- Exams are given bi-weekly unless otherwise indicated.
- Exams on novel are UNANNOUNCED.
- If you are absent on the day of an exam you will have an opportunity to make up ONE exam during the semester.
- You will have a minimum of one class presentation and/or project.
- The final exam will be cumulative and demonstrate your mastery of the reading skills taught during the semester.

<u>Academic Misconduct Policy</u>: Academic misconduct includes misconduct associated with the classroom, laboratory or clinical learning process. Some examples of academic misconduct are cheating and plagiarism.

<u>Cheating</u> includes, but is not limited to, (a) use of any unauthorized assistance in taking quizzes, tests, assessment tests or examinations; (b) dependence upon the aid of sources beyond those authorized by the faculty member in writing papers, preparing reports, solving problems, or carrying out other assignments; or (c) the acquisition, without permission, of tests or other academic material belonging to a member of the college faculty or staff.

<u>Plagiarism</u> includes, but is not limited to, the use of paraphrased or directly quoted published or unpublished work of another person without full and clear acknowledgment. It also includes the unacknowledged use of materials prepared by another person or agency engaged in the selling of term papers or other academic materials. Information gathered from the internet and not properly identified is also considered plagiarism.

Any student found by a faculty member to have committed academic misconduct may be subject to sanctions as determined by the faculty member. Sanctions MAY include a warning, grade adjustment, and course failure. Consequences for plagiarism include a zero on the assignment and a referral to Sergio Lopez, Dean of Student Development and Campus Events.

<u>Attendance Policy/Tardiness</u>: "A student who fails to attend the first meeting of a class MAY be dropped by the instructor immediately following the class. Regular attendance in all classes is expected of all students enrolled. A student may be excluded from further attendance in a class during any semester when absences after the close of registration have exceeded the number of class hours which the class meets per week.

However, if you know two weeks in advance that you will be absent from class, you may make arrangements with me to take the scheduled test (and submit that week's homework) one week early. You may not make up a test that has already been taken by the class. You may not submit late work.
