<u>Objectives</u>: By the end of this course you should have the ability to utilize a variety of intermediate to advanced grammatical structures and vocabulary in your spoken language (individual, pair, and group work) and also listening comprehension.

Outcomes: Analyze and edit spoken language for variety and accuracy in tenses

Analyze and edit spoken language for a complete thought

Demonstrate accuracy in word choice and usage of vocabulary

Demonstrate listening comprehension of and accurate response to wh-information and yes/no questions

Demonstrate clear pronunciation of vowel and consonant sounds without adding or deleting the correct number of syllables in the word

<u>Suggested Resources:</u> Thesaurus, Dictionary (bring to class everyday)

<u>Attendance</u>: You will be dropped if you are absent for more than one week of class hours. One week of class hours equals 5 hours. <u>Oral presentations</u>: You will give individual, pair, and group presentations on a given topic. You will be required to give impromptu presentations using vocabulary and grammar structures from the textbook.

<u>Quizzes</u>: You will have announced/unannounced quizzes each week. This includes written vocabulary, oral speaking, or listening components. For example, I may give you a dictation quiz. You listen to what I say and write down the exact words. I may give you a quiz requiring you to record your answer to a specific question. Your answer might be 1 to 3 minutes long.

<u>Unit tests</u>: You will be given oral and written exams to test your speaking skills including new vocabulary and grammar structures. You will also be responsible for completing listening comprehension exams. Some individual oral presentations will be counted as an exam.

<u>Final Exam</u>: Final exams will be given on the first class meeting during finals week, and the final will be conducted in the same classroom where the class meets during the semester. There will be no late or make up exams, homework, quizzes, etc. unless you have spoken to me before the due date or testing date

<u>Cheating and Plagiarism</u>: Bad!! Bad!! Do I really have to say it? Do not turn in duplicate copies of your classmate's homework. It's difficult to cheat the way the class is set up, but don't be tempted. Again, the reason you are here is for learning, not the grade.
