Course Description: This course is designed to assist advanced ESL students in further developing reading skills and reading efficiency in English. Focus will be placed in understanding text structure and overall comprehension of a variety of texts. Further development of reading skills will also be emphasized. Participation in instructor assigned reading lab activities is a required part of the course.

Student Learning Outcomes (SLOs):

- Distinguish between main ideas and major/minor details in a reading based on word clues.
- 2. Select appropriate vocabulary based on the readings' context clues to aid in overall comprehension.
- 3. Indicate the part of speech of a word.

Attendance: It is of vital importance that you attend each class meeting. Attendance is part of your participation grade. If you miss a week of class you will be dropped. If it is passed the dropped date, you will receive an automatic F. Students who are late 3 times will receive an absence. Assignments & Grading

Reading Lab: As part of this class you must complete the assignment from MyReadinglab. Failure to do so will result in loss of points from your final grade.

Summaries: You will do 2 different summaries. These must be typed, double-spaced, 12 point font and at least 10-12 sentences long. Late assignments will lose points for each week that it is late. Summary 1: Read a book of your choice and write a 10-12 sentence paragraph summarizing the plot. Summary 2: Read a short story or a newspaper/magazine article provided by the instructor. Summarize the main ideas of the story/article in a 10-12 sentence paragraph.

Participation: Participation is a vital component of this course. You are expected to contribute to class discussions on a regular basis. Unwillingness to participate will result in deduction of points from your final grade.

Chapter Quizzes: After the conclusion of each chapter there will be a short quiz.

Final Exam: There will be a final in this class. The Final will be cumulative, which means it'll include everything we have covered in class. Note that if you don't do the assignments and pay attention in class, you will do poorly.

Grading: It is based on a 1000 point total, which includes the Reading Lab, Homework, Exams, and Participation
