Course Description: The standard course in freshman English. The course seeks to improve the student's ability to understand serious and complex prose and to improve the student's ability to write an exposition that is thoughtful and clear including the production of a well-documented research paper.

Class Rules:

- and group work. Make sure your cell phone ringer is off before coming to class and do NOT answer your phone during class unless it is an emergency.
- 3. **Deadlines Count**: Credit will be given for assignments only if they are turned in on time. If you are absent when something is due, you need to contact me immediately.
- 4. **Grade posting**: I will post all grades in Blackboard. I will explain how to log in and use Blackboard during one of the first class meetings.
- 5. **Turning In Essays**: All essays will be turned in via Blackboard. I will explain how to do this during one of the first class meetings.
- 6. **Disruptive students**: Most of you are here to learn, but some students are not serious.
