COURSE DESCRIPTION

This is an introductory course dealing with the historical development of law and constitutional provisions; definitions and the classification of crime and their application to the system of administration of justice; legal research, study of case law, methodology, and concepts of law as a social force are presented. Crimes against persons, property, government, and organized crime are discussed.

COURSE OBJECTIVES

Students will be able to:

- 1. Explain the basics to the United States Constitution and the Amendments.
- 2. Identify the importance of the historical development of our laws and how they relate to the U.S. Constitution.
- 3. Recognize the definitions and classifications of crimes within the criminal justice system.
- 4. Understand what legal research is and how case law influences the practical applications of statute law.
- 5. Explain the basic concepts of the application of law and the methodology of law within our society and how they are used to control and coordinate our social interactions within society.
- 6. Demonstrate the ability to differentiate between various crime types: Felony, Misdemeanor, Infraction, and against Persons, Property, Government and Social Order.
