### **COURSE DESCRIPTION**

This is an advanced course dealing with the historical development of the law enforcement criminal investigation process. Utilizing current industry standards and investigative tools and techniques to explain and explore the modern investigative process. Detailing constitutional provisions; definitions and the classifications of criminal investigation, the student will develop an understanding of investigative theory and the legal processes involved in criminal investigation. The student will learn practical applications of legal research, study of case law, methodology, and concepts of law required during the investigative process. Additionally, investigations involving crimes against persons, property, government, and organized crime are discussed.

### **COURSE OBJECTIVES**

Students will be able to:

- 1. Explain the basics of criminal investigation.
- 2. Understand the history and legal requirements/restrictions of criminal investigations.
- 3. Recognize the definitions and classifications of crimes investigations.
- 4. Understand what legal protections are afforded to someone under investigation.
- 5. Understand the various types of investigations and the resources available for the criminal investigator.
- 6. Understand the importance of Interviewing vs. Interrogation and the responsibilities of the criminal investigator.
