COURSE DESCRIPTION

This class is an in-depth study of the roles and responsibilities of each segment within the justice system; law enforcement, judicial, and corrections. A past, present, and future exposure to each sub-system procedure, from initial entry to final disposition, and the relationship each segment maintains with its system member. (CSU)

COURSE OBJECTIVES (SLO's)

Students will be able to:

1. Demonstrate an understanding of the U.S. Constitution and the Amendments pertaining to the Criminal Justice field by being able to identify the elements of each Amendment and the basic structure of the Federal Government. (ILO1, ILO2, ILO3)
2. Identify the fundamentals of the U.S. Criminal Justice System and the three main parts to the system: Law Enforcement, the Court System, and correctional/Custody Systems. (ILO1, ILO2, ILO4)
3. Identify the Criminal Court Trial Procedures, specifically those areas dealing with Witnesses, Evidence, and Presumption of Innocence. (ILO1, ILO2, ILO4)

TESTS/EXAMS:

There are a total of six (6) tests and one (1) comprehensive Final Examination in this course. Each test will have a time limit of 30 minutes, which means that class starts at 1:30 pm, class attendance is taken, then the test is handed out to the students. You will have 30 minutes, no longer. If you show up late to class, you will have what time is left to complete the test. There will be NO makeup test given. Failure to take an exam will result in a zero for that exam unless prior approval is given by the instructor. Bring a No. 2 Pencil and Scantron form to class on exam days for the test. I DO NOT supply a Scantron or a Pencil for any exam.

AS THERE IS NO RETAKES IN REAL LIFE - THERE WILL BE “NO MAKE UP EXAMS” GIVEN FOR THIS COURSE!

You must communicate to your instructor any problems that you are having with the course or anything affecting you in the performance of the course. That means, if you **cannot** attend class to take the exams, you will communicate that to the instructor and why with paperwork of why you could not be in class to take the exam.
