Course Objectives:

By the completion of the course, each student will:

1. Be able to describe the historical and cultural influences on love, marriage, and the family.
2. Be able to recognize the cultural myths that influence the understanding of marriage and the family as well as the hidden realities that distort what goes on inside families.
3. Be able to compare and contrast traditional and changing sex roles in terms of their impact on marital and familial behavior, and demonstrate awareness of the process of sex role learning.
4. Be able to describe the singles subculture including living together, and the process of pairing and the marriage market.
5. Be able to analyze verbal and nonverbal communication and conflict resolution within marriage.
6. Be able to identify the causes and processes of marital separation and divorce as well as children's response to divorce.
