Course Description

The standard course in freshman English, this course seeks to improve the student's ability to understand serious and complex prose and to improve the student's ability to write an exposition that is thoughtful and clear, including the production of a well-documented research paper.

- This is a Web-mediated course. The student will need access to her/his IVC email account, WebStar, and Blackboard. The student is expected to check her/his IVC email account daily. Specific instructions and assignments will be available only through the Blackboard system.
- The student will need access to the Internet and to Microsoft Word for research and publication purposes.
- In addition, the student is expected to have a good, quality English dictionary. Bilingual students are encouraged to use a bilingual dictionary as well.
- In-class writing assignments must be completed in black or blue ink on standard 8½ x 11 notebook paper with clean edges.
- The student will need a bound composition book in which to maintain an academic journal.
- In addition, the student should purchase four (4) large, 8½ x 11 Green/Blue books for inclass writing assignments.

Student Learning Outcomes

Upon course completion, the successful student will have acquired new skills, knowledge, and or attitudes as demonstrated by being able to:

- 1. Read, analyze, and interpret a variety of written texts, including one single-author text.
- 2. Identify evidence, tone, purpose, and audience, and fallacies in a variety of written works.
- 3. Demonstrate a thorough understanding of the writing process, from development and drafting to revising and editing.
- 4. Demonstrate a command of varying writing patterns, such as comparison and contrast, definition, and argumentation.
- 5. Demonstrate an understanding of connotative and figurative language while writing for an academic audience.
- 6. Adapt writing strategies to the requirements of the writing situation (e.g., to essay exam or other timed writing, research writing, reflective writing).
- 7. Examine and analyze one's own writing and that of other students with a view towards improving the effectiveness of the written work.
- 8. Develop text analysis and interpretation supported by citations, synthesized with the study and application of documentation styles and library skills (including electronic databases) to produce a research paper.
- 9. Demonstrate an understanding of the writing process by writing at least four essays using a variety of rhetorical modes, along with one research paper, composing a total of 8,000-10,000 words.

10. Participate in a number of activities and areas of study as deemed appropriate by the instructor.

Spelling and Penmanship

A text demonstrates the writer's skill and competence in composition. In this composition course, correct spelling, appropriate grammar, and legible penmanship are expected. Therefore, submitted assignments which lack correct spelling, appropriate grammar, or legible penmanship are not acceptable.

Plagiarism and Cheating

Submitting a paper or essay to the instructor is a form of publication protected by the appropriate copyright laws of the United States. Therefore, the use of another's words, phrases, ideas, and/or organization, delivered as the student's own words, phrases, ideas, and/or organization is plagiarism. Any student found to have plagiarized materials in any writing assignment will receive a failing grade for the assignment.

Given the definition of plagiarism, the following rule-of-thumb will apply to papers submitted in this class. Any three words (or more) taken in sequence from a published source, without correct punctuation and documentation, is considered plagiarism. For the purposes of this class, there is no difference between accidental and intentional plagiarism. Therefore, the student is warned to pay close attention to instruction provided regarding the use of quotation marks and the correct application of parenthetical references in one's essays.

Students are encouraged to join study groups and/or to seek tutoring assistance in the development of their writing skills. However, each student is expected to write her or his own papers. Cheating is defined as fraud, deceit, or dishonesty in an academic assignment or using or attempting to use materials, or assisting others in using materials, or assisting others in using materials, which are prohibited or inappropriate in the context of the academic assignment in question. Any student found to have cheated will receive a failing grade on the exam or assignment.

Repeated acts of cheating may result in an F in the course and/or disciplinary action. Please refer to the General School Catalog for more information on academic dishonesty or other misconduct. Acts of cheating include, but are not limited to the following:

- o plagiarism
- o copying or attempting to copy from others during an examination or on an assignment;
- o communicating test information with another person during an examination;
- o allowing others to do an assignment or portion of an assignment use of a commercial term paper service.

The instructor may report incidents of plagiarism or cheating to the Campus Disciplinary Officer.

Maintenance of Records

The instructor will attempt to return to the student all class materials. The student should keep these materials until after the final grade has been posted and accepted. These materials will be needed in the event the student elects to challenge the posted final grade.

Materials not returned to the student by the final class meeting will be held in the instructor's office through the first four weeks of the next term. Any papers not retrieved by the student will become the property of the instructor and may be used (in part or whole) as sample texts in future courses.

Emergency Procedures
