## **Course Description**

The course will cover the general part of criminal law: the nature, origins, structure, sources, and purposes of criminal law and criminal punishment; the constitutional limits on the criminal law; the general principles of criminal liability; the defenses of justification and excuse; parties to a crime and vicarious liability; and incomplete crimes. It will also cover the special part of the criminal law; the major crimes against persons; crimes against homes and property; crimes against public order and morals; and crimes against the state.
