Course Description

An overview of the leadership and management process as it relates to management of patient care is presented. Clinical application is integrated into VN courses. Critical thinking is introduced for evidence-based client care through situational assessments, patient safety, identification of problematic areas, recognition of available solutions, and "best practices" for decision-making.

Student Learning Outcomes

- A. Demonstrate critical thinking and judgment in clinical decision making related to interactions with patients
- B. Identify leadership techniques useful to LVN practice and improvement of care.
- C. Identify legal and safety issues related to the LVN practice.

Course Objectives

The purpose of this course is to develop a rudimentary "tool box" of leadership skills and critical thinking abilities for the first semester VN student that will be applied to all subsequent clinical applications. Upon completion of this unit, the student will

- relate Maslow's hierarchy of needs to motivating personnel.
- discuss components of the communication process.
- relate the communication process to managing personnel.
- contrast the role of a variety of nursing personnel
- discuss issues involved in staffing patterns.
- describe methods of conflict resolution.
- discuss common organizational structures found in the health care industry.
- analyze the influence of the organizational structure on patient care management
- discuss economic issues related to the health care industry.
- identify how the nurse influences safety for patients throughout the health care system.
- understand the utilization of the nursing process in caring for patients:

Course Requirements and Instructional Methods

Reading, CD/video, oral and writing assignments are required. The reading list includes those required of this course and additional outside assignments. Writing assignments will reflect the objectives listed and may include, but not be limited to, short essays, journals, and/or professional papers. Outside assignments including but not limited to independent and group exercises and learning center activities may be assigned and are required. Students may be referred back to the nursing learning center tutor if needed to support the learning environment. You are expected to increase participation and readiness for class as the semester progresses. Participation includes class discussions, asking/answering questions, and group project work. Similarly, the expectation of class content knowledge will increase as the semester progresses.

<u>Out of Class Assignments</u>: The Department of Education policy states that one (1) credit hour is the amount of student work that reasonably approximates not less than one hour of class time <u>and</u> two (2) hours of out-of-class time per week over the span of a semester. WASC has adopted a similar requirement.

Course Grading Based on Course Objectives

Grading will include home assignments, class participation, group projects, no more than 6 quizzes and the final exam. THERE WILL BE NO MAKE-UPS FOR TESTS OR QUIZZES MISSED DUE TO ABSENCE UNLESS EXTREME CONDITION ARISES. A total grade of 75% or above and passing the final at 75% or above are required to pass this class.

Students must maintain a "C" average grade as determined by the scale below:

A = 92-100% B = 83-91% C = 75-82% D = 68-74% F = Below 68% Grades will not be rounded. To advance to the next semester, a "C" or better is required in this course and the co-requisite courses. The student is responsible for dropping (W) the class before the deadline as outlined on registration forms. Failure to pass this class will affect the ability to progress to the next semester. Students failing must make an appointment to speak with the Director of Nursing Education.

Content emphasized in class reading assignments, presentations, lectures, discussions, and some journal assignments will be used in the quizzes and examinations. The point values for major assignments are listed below with due dates to be given during the class. Journals x 4 at up to 10 pts/each; Class participation: Up to 10 pts; 4 quizes at up to 100 pts/each; 2 group presentations at up to 100 pts/each; Final exam at up to 100 pts.

Attendance

It is the responsibility of each student to attend all class time and to contact the faculty person before the start of class of any need to be excused from class. Absences are limited to the number of hours class meets in one week. A student who reaches the maximum allowable hours of absenteeism may be dropped by the instructor. Acceptance of absenteeism excuses is at the discretion of the faculty member. A student who reaches the maximum allowable number of hours absent may file a petition to reenter the nursing program. The teaching team will meet with the student to discuss remediation and the possibility of reentry.

- A student who fails to attend the first meeting of a class or does not complete the first mandatory activity of an online class will be dropped by the instructor as of the first official meeting of that class. Should readmission be desired, the student's status will be the same as that of any other student who desires to add a class. It is the student's responsibility to drop or officially withdraw from the class. See <u>General Catalog</u> for details.
- Regular attendance in all classes is expected of all students. A student whose continuous, unexcused absences exceed the number of hours the class is scheduled to meet per week may be dropped. For online courses, students who fail to complete required activities for two consecutive weeks may be considered to have excessive absences and may be dropped.
- Absences attributed to the representation of the college at officially approved events (conferences, contests, and field trips) will be counted as 'excused' absences.

Classroom Etiquette

- <u>Electronic Devices</u>: Cell phones and electronic devices must be turned off and put away during class, unless otherwise directed by the instructor.
- <u>Food and Drink</u> are prohibited in all classrooms. Water bottles with lids/caps are the only exception. Additional restrictions will apply in labs. Please comply as directed by the instructor.
- <u>Disruptive Students</u>: Students who disrupt or interfere with a class may be sent out of the room and told to meet with the Campus Disciplinary Officer before returning to continue with coursework. Disciplinary procedures will be followed as outlined in the <u>General Catalog</u>.

- <u>Plagiarism</u> is taking and presenting as one's own the writings or ideas of others, without citing the source.
