Course Description

Preparation for ENGL 110. The course seeks to facilitate the student's mastery of the short essay at the college level. The course follows in sequence from ENGL 008 (ENGL 098). (Nontransferable, nondegree applicable)

Student Learning Outcomes

Upon course completion, the successful student will have acquired new skills, knowledge, and or attitudes as demonstrated by being able to:

1. Compose a multi paragraph essay that responds to an essay prompt with a clear controlling idea or thesis statement. (ILO1, ILO2, ILO4)
2. Compose a multi paragraph essay with a clear organizational structure and adequate support. (ILO1, ILO2, ILO3, ILO4)
3. Compose a multi paragraph essay that uses correctly formed sentences with virtually no sentence level or grammar errors. (ILO1, ILO2, ILO4)
4. Develop a research paper that effectively synthesizes ideas and information from multiple sources and utilizes correct MLA formatting of citations. (ILO1, ILO2, ILO3, ILO4, ILO5))

Course Objectives

Upon satisfactory completion of the course, students will be able to:

1. Develop and write expository essays totaling at least 4,000 words, including a mini research paper.
2. Design an essay plan based on concrete data in prewriting exercises that produces a controlling idea or thesis statement.
3. Organize content to support a thesis statement and subsequent supporting paragraphs while studying and applying various rhetorical modes with emphasis on comparison/contrast, definition, cause/effect, and argumentation.
4. Demonstrate the ability to write a paper for an academic audience.
5. Synthesize ideas and information from multiple sources in the development of a writing assignment that is supported by citations from the reading.

6. Practice a variety of sentence types and demonstrate principles of effective sentence construction and punctuation.
7. Practice and successfully demonstrate the skills in areas designated by the instructor to be appropriate supplemental activities of improved writing technique.
8. Understand academic ethics, and avoid plagiarism.

Course Requirements and Instructional Methods

This course is focused on getting you ready for English 110, which requires you to already have mastered essays, the writing process, argumentation, and research methodologies. To do this, it is imperative that you attend every class and complete every assignment.

If you do the work, show up to class, pay attention and participate, you will surprise yourself with your improvement and success in the course. If you do not, you will struggle to earn a passing grade for the semester, and barring any extenuating circumstances, will receive little sympathy from me.

The course also includes readings which you are required to complete and respond to in writing. These readings will culminate with the final research paper.

- Major Essays:
 - Includes Brainstorm, Formal Outline, First Draft, Reverse Outline, and Final Draft.
 - Brainstorms will consist of class work and homework designed for each essay and will be graded pass or fail.
 - Formal Outline are a specific mapping of your essay prior to writing the first draft and will be graded pass or fail.
 - First Drafts are required to be longer than the final draft by at least a whole page and will be graded pass or fail.
 - Reverse Outlines are based on your first draft and will be handed along with it.
 - Final Drafts will receive a letter grade and will be the bulk of your grade for the assignment.
 - NOTE:
 - Only the Final Draft will be accepted late, with a letter grade deducted each day it is late.
 - All other assignments will not be graded and receive a zero if submitted late.
 - However, you must complete ALL assignments, even if they're late and they get a zero, in order to submit your Final Draft.
- Common Final:
 - This is an in-class essay assigned by the English Department. You must attend class to take this essay, only serious emergencies will be considered if you fail to do so.
 - The essay is based on a reading prompt provided by the department and is graded by two other English instructors other than me.
 - They are graded pass or fail.
 - I have final say on your grade but will only personally grade your essay if both instructors disagree over your grade.
- In-Class Essays:
 - Assigned every two weeks (give or take) for a total of 7 for the semester.
 - Graded pass or fail.
 - Based on writing prompts using in-class readings from *Short Takes*.
- Grammar Midterm and Final:
 - Graded on a percentage.

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- Based on grammar lectures.
- Vocabulary Quizzes
 - Every two weeks based on commonly misused/misspelled word lists I will provide you.
- Class Participation will be based on your timely attendance and active participation in class.

Out of Class Assignments: The Department of Education policy states that one (1) credit hour is the amount of student work that reasonably approximates not less than one hour of class time and two (2) hours of out-of-class time per week over the span of a semester. WASC has adopted a similar requirement.

Attendance

- A student who fails to attend the first meeting of a class or does not complete the first mandatory activity of an online class will be dropped by the instructor as of the first official meeting of that class.
