Course Description

A further study of the concepts of algebra. Topics covered include linear and quadratic equations, relations, functions and graphs, systems of equations, logarithms and exponential functions, conic sections, and sequences and series.

Student Learning Outcomes

By the end of this course, you will be able to (1) solve quadratic equations by factoring, completing the square, and quadratic formula, (2) solve equations involving radicals, (3) recognize and graph equations of conic sections, (4) solve three by three linear systems by elimination and/or substitution, and (5) solve an application involving exponential functions. These outcomes will be assessed through selected exercises on exams throughout the semester.

Course Objectives

Through various activities and assessments, students will:

1. Demonstrate an understanding of radical expressions and equations.
2. Demonstrate an ability to solve systems of applications, including systems with three equations and three variables.
3. Demonstrate an understanding of quadratic functions, including graphing and equations.
4. Demonstrate an understanding of functions and relations, including one to one functions.
5. Demonstrate an understanding of logarithmic and exponential functions and their graphs.
6. Classify and graph ellipses, parabolas, and hyperbolas.
7. Demonstrate an understanding of sequences and series and their operations.

Textbooks & Other Resources or Links

1. **Textbook:** Introductory and Intermediate Algebra, 4E by Blitzer (Custom book), Pearson Publisher. You will have a few options for the textbook.
 - a. **Option 1:** Purchase the textbook new (bundled with MathXL).
 - b. **Option 2:** You may purchase the book used and buy MathXL access separately.
 - c. **Option 3:** You may choose to not buy the physical textbook, and just purchase MathXL access. You will have access to the textbook pages through the homework.
 - d. **Option 4:** Just buy the book used without MathXL.Note: MathXL is **OPTIONAL**.

2. **Calculator:** A basic calculator, like a TI-30 (costs around \$10) is recommended, or you can go with a graphing calculator, like the TI-83 or TI-84; it really depends on what other math or science classes you plan on taking later on.

3. **MathXL:** When you register in MathXL, you will be asked to enroll in a course. Use the Course ID: XL27-N1S6-901Z-1T52.

Course Requirements and Instructional Methods

Homework: There will be **exercises** assigned from every section that we cover **FOR PRACTICE ONLY**. You will not turn these in. These homework exercises can be completed out of the textbook, the interactmath.com website, or within the MathXL homework system.

Quizzes: There will be six (6) short quizzes given throughout the semester, to be taken in class. Most will cover a few sections and will have 2-5 exercises for you to complete. **There will be no make-up quizzes. At the end of the semester the lowest quiz score will be dropped and the top 5 will count.**

Tests: There will be four (4) tests during the semester. Tests 1, 2, & 3 will take place at the end of short clusters of topics. See the schedule below. Test 4 is the final. **There will be no make-up exams.** If you miss any exam, it will be recorded as a zero, and **the final exam percentage** will be used to replace that score at the end of the semester. If you miss the final, it will be recorded as a zero.

Out of Class Assignments: The Department of Education policy states that one (1) credit hour is the amount of student work that reasonably approximates not less than one hour of class time and two (2) hours of out-of-class time per week over the span of a semester. WASC has adopted a similar requirement.

Attendance
