Course Description per Catalog:

This is a beginning level language course in Modern Standard Arabic. This course will be proficiency-based and will develop rudimentary ability in the four basic language skills; speaking, listening, reading, and writing. Emphasis will be placed on understanding basic grammatical concepts, vocabulary building, and sociolinguistics. (CSU, UC)

Goals and/or Objectives:

Upon satisfactory completion of the course, students will be able to:

1. Demonstrate knowledge of the Arabic character systems; identify, pronounce and combine letters of the Arabic alphabet to create words and sentences.
2. Understand the relation and identify differences between phonological variation, colloquial and formal Arabic.
3. Use basic grammar and grammatical structures to begin reading, writing and speaking in Arabic.
4. Apply common daily-life vocabulary in conversational situations such as greetings, introductions, inquiries about the well-being of another person, and seeking and providing information on a variety of subjects.
5. Identify and discuss Arab art, culture, and customs
6. Recognize the variety of Arab states, political systems and capitals.

Student Learning Outcomes:

Upon course completion, the successful student will have acquired new skills, knowledge, and or attitudes as demonstrated by being able to:

1. Apply common daily-life vocabulary in conversational situations such as greetings and introductions. (ILO1, ILO5)
2. Identify and distinguish between Arab states, political systems and capitals. (ILO3, ILO5)
3. Identify, pronounce and combine letters of the Arabic alphabet to create syllables and words. (ILO1)
4. Identify and distinguish between formal and spoken Arabic. (ILO1, ILO5)
5. Interpret main ideas in basic readings given in class. (ILO1, ILO2, ILO5)

Grading Policies:

Final test ----- 30%

- This is a comprehensive and cumulative exam covering all the material learned in the *Alif Baa* book. It is scheduled before the spring break. Only students with valid documented absences may retake the midterm within one week of their resumption of attendance.

Oral final test ----- 5 %

- This is a comprehensive cumulative oral interview scheduled during the last week of classes. The format will be discussed as we approach the end of the semester.

Homework ----- 10%

- Regular thorough preparation of the material assigned: in-depth reading, completing exercises, checking new vocabulary, and preparing for class ahead of time should enable you to be active and critical participants in class. No late homework will be accepted.

Unannounced short Quizzes ----- 20 %

- These are short quizzes to test vocabulary, grammar, and concepts that you have learned in class and at home. They are a way to assure that you are keeping up with the assignments, as well as a means to reinforce subjects covered in a given week. There will be no make-up quizzes.

Participation and Attendance ----- 20%

- Participation is essential. The course involves a high level of teamwork. It is imperative that you attend class regularly and punctually in order to participate in and benefit from these activities.
- In-class discussions and activities are designed to practice grammar and improve your oral skills. You will regularly be asked to report on or to introduce parts of the

homework assigned in order to set the stage for further discussion in class. Participation will be graded throughout the semester based on effort, preparation for class, and contribution to a cooperative classroom atmosphere. You will receive a grade on a daily basis.

- Regular attendance is expected, as it is necessary to your progress and to maintaining a constructive environment for group learning.

Project ----- 15%

- Students will make a PowerPoint presentation or poster and present it in class. Students will choose an Arab country and talk about all aspects of culture, including, but not limited to, food, music, flag, location, sports, etc.
- This project will combine all aspects of instruction taught throughout the semester.

Attendance
