- 1 Demonstrate the locations of pitches on the piano keyboard and on the bass and treble clefs. (ILO2, ILO4)
- 2 Perform selected songs on flutophone with correct pitches and rhythm. (ILO2, ILO4)
- 3 Write and identify all 15 major scales. (ILO2, ILO4)
- 4 Write in counting for rhythms consisting of half, quarter and eighth note/rests. (ILO2, ILO4)

Upon satisfactory completion of the course, students will be able to:

1. the staff, and treble, and bass clefs;
2. duration of sound and silence (notes and rests);
3. scales (major; and natural, harmonic and melodic minor);
4. solfeggio (using numbers 1-7, or do-re-mi etc.);
5. measures, meter, and time signatures;
6. dynamics;
7. tempo;
8. expression;
9. intervals (diminished, minor, major, perfect, and augmented) from the prime to the octave;
10. chords, (diminished, minor, major, augmented, and dominant seventh) including all inversions
11. smooth voice leading of triadic accompaniment;

12. transposition of melody and accompaniment.

Course Requirements and Instructional Methods

Class Routine: The student will be at each class session on time, with the required texts, flutophone, a #2 pencil, and a notebook in which to keep notes, class handouts, assignments, and tests.

The course will cover approximately eight lessons (two units) every week. Every fourth lesson is a review lesson where the student can administer a self-test. The answers are in the back of the book so that the student can check his/her understanding of the material presented. Any material missed on the review lesson should be re-studied and the self-test re-taken. If the problem still persists, the student should mark the question and ask about it the next class session.

Course Grading Based on Course Objectives

Quizzes: There will be TEN quizzes, one approximately every 8 lessons covering two units. Each quiz has 20-25 questions. The quiz with the lowest grade will be dropped and not included in the final grade average. Quizzes are worth 100 points each. You are allowed *two quiz re-takes* (if requested) before final exam day. **Please note:** If you miss a quiz due to an unexcused absence, you will receive a grade of ZERO. **No make-ups are allowed**, unless the absence is excused by the instructor.

Performance Tests: In this class the student will also learn to play simple melodies on the flutophone. **On the flutophone** there will be four performance tests worth 100 points each.

Final: The final exam will consist of a performance component (100 points) and a written (100 question Scantron) component (200 points) for a total of 300 points.

Grade: The grade will be based on strict percentages. The student need only divide the total number of points received out of the total number of points possible to know his/her grade at any time.

(Make sure to include **ALL** tests in the tally, and delete the lowest written test.)

Attendance

Required language

- A student who fails to attend the first meeting of a class or does not complete the first mandatory activity of an online class will be dropped by the instructor as of the first official meeting of that class.
