I. Course Description

RELS 100 is an introduction to the concepts of what makes a religion a religion and why that might matter. We will study the basic beliefs, history and traditions of several of the world's major religious traditions including Hinduism, Buddhism, Judaism, Christianity and Islam. Objectivity and openness are important characteristics of this study, seeking to understand the significance of religious pluralism.
