Course Description

The course is designed to provide the students with information on processing systems of the body and how the body reacts to alcohol and psychoactive drugs. This course will seek to explain where and how drugs act in a certain way and why. This course will bring about an understanding of how drugs influence consciousness, mood, and feeling. It will enable students to understand that both the internal and external environments and genetic have important effects on the well-being of the individual.

Student Learning Outcomes

Upon course completion, the successful student will have acquired new skills, knowledge, and or attitudes as demonstrated by being able to:

1. Identify Uppers, Downers, and All Arounders, and identify the physiological effect on the body and mind.
2. Identify cultural differences in alcohol and drugs use and treatment modalities appropriate to culture and environment.
3. Identify post-acute withdrawal symptoms for addicts as well as family members.

Course Objectives

Upon satisfactory completion of the course, students will be able to:

Engage students to gain knowledge and awareness of the physiological effects of psychoactive drugs and alcohol on the human body and identify the physiological functioning of the central nervous system.

1. Students will describe the disease concept of alcoholism and explain the pharmacological effects of alcohol, the entire nervous system, and the entire organ system. (Cardiovascular, gastrointestinal, respiratory, reproductive, urogenital, skin, endocrine, and fluid balance systems).
2. Students will recognize the physiological effects of narcotics, analgesics, hypnotic drugs, tranquilizers, stimulants, and hallucinogenic drugs such as marijuana.

Course Requirements and Instructional Methods

This course will consist of a combination of lectures, class discussion, assigned readings, videos, individual projects and performance on quizzes and exams.

Thought Paper Assignments:

There will be three (3) thought papers due at various times during the semester. These are essays of 1-2 pages, which will be based on the readings and class material. **Late papers will not be accepted and I DO NOT accept thought papers by e-mail.** Thought papers should address the following: An interesting idea regarding the physiological effects of alcohol and drugs from the text, class discussion, an article from the internet or magazine, and /or a television program, from your point of view. Don't provide a review of the reading/program, but your own thoughts. The main focus of thought papers is for you to learn to think critically and to understand the physiological effects of alcohol and drugs. The intention of the assignment is to get some ideas down about the readings and then begin exploring ideas. You do not have to write what you think I would agree with or what is necessarily true, you just need to justify your ideas and statements with explanations.

Quizzes: Ten (10) quizzes will be given before each chapter lecture. No late quizzes will be accepted. Each quiz will be worth 10 points.

Project Assignment: Heredity, Environment & Psychoactive Drugs Personal Experience Project will chronicle the student's personal experience with a psychoactive substance or substances. This project should be a minimum of five typewritten pages, written in an APA style format. The project may exceed five pages. To enhance this project, photographs, drawings, poems, and other items may be included but note, that these articles are not required nor will they count towards the five typewritten pages. Such items should be used to enhance your project, if you have them.

Group Assignment: There will be one (1) group assignment given, worth 50 points. More information about this assignment will be given at a later date.

Exams: Four exams will be given. Exams will consist of multiple choice, and true and false. No make up exams will be given unless you have called me **PRIOR** to the exam and let me know that you will not be able to take the exam. If you contact me prior to the exam, you will have one week to make-up the exam. Each exam will be worth 50 points. Please bring a #2 pencil and a scantron to each examination.

Class participation and Attendance: At the beginning of each class, attendance will be taken (roll call). If a student must arrive late or leave early, the instructor should be notified so that the student is not penalized unfairly. It is the student's responsibility to let the instructor know when they are in class, particularly if they miss the roll call. Class participation will be measured by presence, active interest and involvement in discussions, exercises and presentations.

Attendance
