Course Description

An introduction to the mathematical concepts needed for further study in Algebra. Topics covered will include the real number system, variable expressions, solving equations, measurement and conversions, and geometry. (Nontransferable, non-degree applicable)

Prerequisite: MATH 61 with C or better or Math placement test.

1. Perform the basic operations with rational numbers. (ILO2)
2. Compute the area and perimeter of standard geometric shapes. (ILO2)
3. Solve equations appropriate for a Pre-Algebra class. (ILO2)

1. Demonstrate skills in working with real numbers.
2. Demonstrate an understanding of variable expressions.
3. Demonstrate an understanding of solving equations.
4. Demonstrate an understanding of the English and Metric measurement systems in a wide variety of settings.
5. Apply relevant formulas in application problems involving a variety of geometric figures.

Course Requirements and Instructional Methods

Homework

Quiz/Pop-quiz/Group Project

A quiz may be given at any time during any class period. It may not be announced. The number of quizzes in the semester will be instructor's discretion. The purpose is to provide a feedback on the learning outcome. The lowest quiz scores will be dropped. The quiz will contribute a small portion of the semester grade.

Tests

There will be four tests. No make-up tests will be given. **Exceptions can be made only for verifiable family or medical emergencies.** The lowest score of the chapter tests will be dropped. If a test is missed, it will be the test score that is dropped. The purpose of these tests is to check your understanding of the concepts covered in the course. Most of the questions on these tests will require showing a significant amount of work. A correct answer with insufficient work will receive partial credit or no credit.

*Bring your own papers and pens/pencils on test days.

Final Exam

At the end of the semester, a COMPREHENSIVE/CUMULATIVE Final Exam will be given. If you miss the final, it will be recorded as a zero.

Attendance
