Course Description

ESL 061 provides beginning level students additional review, practice, and instruction in basic vocabulary. Topics to be covered include: community life, home, describing people and places, food, colors and clothing. Focus will be on written and communicative activities designed to increase fluency. (Nontransferable, nondegree applicable)

- 3. Recognize, respond to, and produce statements, questions and answers in original sentences with target vocabulary words both orally and in writing.

Out of Class Assignments:

Attend a cultural event in your community, such as a parade, fair, etc. Take some photos at the event. Write a 7 to 10-sentence paragraph about it. Attach the photos you took.

Reading and Writing:

Find a newspaper article on one of the following topics: community life, home, describing people and places, food, colors and clothing. Make a list of the main ideas in the article based on the title, photos, captions, and information presented in the article.

Attendance
