Course Description: A course designed to present the basic fundamentals of weight training such as the weight apparatus, proper lifting techniques and basic knowledge of specific muscle groups. Equips the students with a variety of exercises and conditioning activities which can be used to maintain physical fitness throughout college and adult life.

Student Learning Outcomes:

1. Create and implement a comprehensive personal strength training program.
2. Demonstrate knowledge of strength development and appropriate weight training principles.

Course Objectives:

1. Understand fitness components.
2. Participate in personal assessments.
3. Write personal fitness programs.
4. Understand proper equipment use and safety.

Assignments:

Out-of-class: Plan a personal workout program which includes cardiovascular fitness, muscular strength, and body composition.

Reading and Writing: Read an article on the benefits of water. Write a paper describing your personal water consumption needs and include 3 benefits to proper water intake.

Grading: Final grade will be based on the total of points accumulated, 90%=A, 80%=B, 70%=C, 60%=D. Points come from Quiz, Assignment, Fitness Assessments, Class Attendance, and Final Exam. Late assignments will receive only partial credit. No Extra Credit!

Attendance:

- A student who fails to attend the first meeting of a class or does not complete the first mandatory activity of an online class will be dropped by the instructor as of the first official meeting of that class. Should readmission be desired, the student's status will be the same as that of any other student who desires to add a class. It is the student's responsibility to drop or officially withdraw from the class. See General Catalog for details.
- Regular attendance in all classes is expected of all students. A student whose continuous, unexcused absences exceed the number of hours the class is scheduled to meet per week may be dropped. For online courses, students who fail to complete required activities for two consecutive weeks may be considered to have excessive absences and may be dropped.
- Absences attributed to the representation of the college at officially approved events (conferences, contests, and field trips) will be counted as 'excused' absences.
- Workout clothing must be worn for lab classes. If you do not dress out, you will not be permitted to attend lab classes. You must bring a towel to class.

- Lockers are available in the locker rooms. We do not assign them or provide locks. Larger lockers are for class time only.

Classroom Etiquette:

- Electronic Devices: Cell phones and electronic devices must be turned off and put away during class unless otherwise directed by the instructor.
- Food and Drink are prohibited in all classrooms. Water bottles with lids/caps are the only exception. Additional restrictions will apply in labs. Please comply as directed.
- Disruptive Students: Students who disrupt or interfere with a class may be sent out of the room and told to meet with the Campus Disciplinary Officer before returning to continue with coursework. Disciplinary procedures will be followed as outlined in the General Catalog.
- Children in the classroom: Due to college rules and state laws, no one who is not enrolled in the class may attend, including children.

Academic Honesty:

- Plagiarism is to take and present as one's own the writings or ideas of others, without citing the source. You should understand the concept of plagiarism and keep it in mind when taking exams and preparing written materials. If you do not understand how to correctly 'cite a source', you must ask for help.
- Cheating is defined as fraud, deceit, or dishonesty in an academic assignment or using or attempting to use materials, or assisting others in using materials, or assisting others in using materials, which are prohibited or inappropriate in the context of the academic assignment in question.

Anyone caught cheating will receive a zero (0) on the exam or assignment, and the instructor may report the incident to the Campus Disciplinary Officer, who may place related documentation in a file.
