- 9. Demonstrate prioritization of nursing care and goals and the organization of individuals or groups towards goal setting and goal advancement.

Two (2) hours of independent work done out of class per each hour of lecture or class work, or 3 hours lab, practicum, or the equivalent per unit is expected.

Course Grading Based on Course Objectives

Each student will participate in an analysis exam that is not graded. These items will highlight areas in which each individual student should focus on as they prepare for the NCLEX-RN examination.

Attendance

This class has 5 Instruction days. If you are absent more than day, you will be dropped from the class. If you no longer plan to attend class it is your responsibility, not the Instructor's, to drop you from the class. Students are strongly encouraged to meet all class sessions as homework and assignments will be provided at the end of lecture.

- A student who fails to attend the first meeting of a class or does not complete the first mandatory activity of an online class will be dropped by the instructor as of the first official meeting of that class. Should readmission be desired, the student's status will be the same as that of any other student who desires to add a class. - Regular attendance in all classes is expected of all students. A student whose continuous, unexcused absences exceed the number of hours the class is scheduled to meet per week may be dropped.
