Course Description

An introduction to the basic concepts of music. The course offers a development of the skills and knowledge needed to read music, to hear music, and to use an instrument and the singing voice with skill. Music Performance is also stressed.

Student Learning Outcomes

Upon course completion, the successful student will have acquired new skills, knowledge, and or attitudes as demonstrated by being able to:

Demonstrate knowledge of musical notation, ledger lines, sharps, flats, naturals, diatonic and chromatic triads, sevenths chords, inverted chords, major scales (sharp and flat scales), key signatures, and simple music transposition skills. Additionally, demonstrate advanced beginning to early intermediate skill of playing melodies on the flutophone in ensemble and individually.

Course Objectives

The student will gain a fundamental knowledge of music, including:

- The staff, the treble and bass clefs.
- Note's value (up to sixteenth notes and rest notes).
- Accidentals, Scales (major and minor) and key signatures.
- Measures, meter, and time signatures.
- Dynamics, tempo, expression.
- Intervals (perfect, major, minor, diminished and augmented).
- Chords (major, minor, augmented, diminished, and dominant 7th chords).
- Transposition of simple melodies and accompaniment.
- Singing and performance of simple, fun songs.
- Performance of simple melodies with singing.

Course Requirements and Instructional Methods

Students are expected to be at each class session with the required text, a notebook to record notes, assignments, Quiz and tests. Students are expected to do the Lesson Review Exercises which appear every 3 lessons in the text.

Out of Class Assignments: The Department of Education policy states that one (1) credit hour is the amount of student work that reasonably approximates not less than one hour of class time and two (2) hours of out-of-class time per week over the span of a semester. WASC has adopted a similar requirement.

Attendance

- A student who fails to attend the first meeting of a class or does not complete the first mandatory activity of an online class will be dropped by the instructor as of the first official meeting of that class.
