Course Description

A further study of the concepts of algebra. Topics covered include linear and quadratic equations, relations, functions and graphs, systems of equations, logarithmics and exponential functions, conic sections, and sequences and series. (Nontransferable, AA/AS degree only)

Quizzes: For the most part quizzes will be drawn from the homework. There will be quizzes on MyMathLab, and in class. You will need a scantron for most in-class quizzes. There will be no make up quizzes.



Exams: There will be 3 exams, each worth 17% of your total grade. You must show all work on the exam to receive credit. Scratch paper is **NOT** allowed. You may use a scientific calculator on each exam. You may **NOT** use a graphing calculator. There will be no make-up exams. All exams are to be taken closed book, and closed notes. The Final exam will be cumulative.

Attendance

- A student who fails to attend the first meeting of a class or does not complete the first mandatory activity of an online class will be dropped by the instructor as of the first official meeting of that class. Should readmission be desired, the student's status will be the same as that of any other student who desires to add a class.
