# **Course Description**

**Required language**: The course will cover the philosophy of Administration of Justice in America and it's various subsystems. It will examine the roles and role expectations of criminal justice agents and their interrelationship in society. The concepts of crime causations, punishment and rehabilitation are introduced. The basic course provides a better understanding of the criminal justice system and orients the student to career opportunities. Ethics, education and training for professionalism in the system are discussed

- 6. Summarize the history, structure and operation of the American correctional system.
- 7. Compare and contrast the juvenile justice system and its interrelationships with the criminal justice system.
