### **Course Description**

This course is designed to engage students with a variety of fitness techniques and activities to determine personal goals for increasing their personal fitness. A number of fitness components will be explored: strength, muscular endurance, flexibility and balance, cardiorespiratory endurance, and body composition.

## **Student Learning Outcomes**

Upon course completion, the successful student will have acquired new skills, knowledge, and or attitudes as demonstrated by being able to:

- 1. Identify correct strength training principles and design a personal strength training program (IL02)
- 2. Identify correct cardiovascular principles and design a personal cardiovascular program (IL02)

# **Course Objectives**

- The student will define and identify the health-related benefits associated with maintaining an acceptable level of physical fitness and consequently, wellness.
- The student will identify the unique benefits of weight training for women and refute most misconceptions concerning women and weight training.
- The student will apply and interpret the basic scientific principles related to increasing fitness levels.
- The student will identify major muscle groups.
- The student will use proper form and follow exercise safety principles while executing exercises.

- The student will demonstrate and perform dynamic warm-up exercise for upper and lower body before each workout.
- The student will demonstrate proper cool-down techniques at the end of each workout by performing static flexibility exercises for all major muscle groups.
- The student will be able to assess progress and evaluate the results f her individualized training program.

## **Course Requirements and Instructional Methods**

This is a predominantly activity class, so be prepared to exercise each class beginning 8/20. To participate, students **must** be properly dressed in workout attire, including appropriate athletic footwear. To obtain full credit for the day, students must arrive to class on time and actively participate in the workout. Each class session will consist of warm-up, workout and cool down.

Workout session will consist of dynamic warmup, a 20 min. cardiovascular activity, a weight training circuit and a flexibility cool-down.

Some class sessions will require the completion of a specified worksheet. To document exercise activities Students will be required to record training and conditioning information in the textbook.

Out of Class Assignments: The Department of Education policy states that one (1) credit hour is the amount of student work that reasonably approximates not less than one hour of class time and two (2) hours of out-of-class time per week over the span of a semester. WASC has adopted a similar requirement.

### **Attendance**

- A student who fails to attend the first meeting of a class or does not complete the first mandatory activity of an online class will be dropped by the instructor as of the first official meeting of that class. Should readmission be desired, the student's status will be the same as that of any other student who desires to add a class. It is the student's responsibility to drop or officially withdraw from the class. See General Catalog for details.
- Regular attendance in all classes is expected of all students. A student whose continuous, unexcused absences exceed the number of hours the class is scheduled to meet per week may be dropped.
- Each student is allowed two absences which do not affect her grade. The participation grade will drop 10% for each occurrence after the first two absences. The sixth absence it will result in failing the class.
- Tardies count. Three tardies equal one absence
- Make-ups are allowed. Maximum 2. Arrangements must be made with the instructor. Must be taken care of within 2 weeks of returning to class.
- Absences attributed to the representation of the college at officially approved events (conferences, contests, and field trips) will be counted as 'excused' absences and can be made up.
- Students are considered late if the arrive 5 minutes after the start time for class. At 10 minutes they are
  considered absent. IT IS THE RESPONSIBILITY OF THE LATE STUDENT TO VERIFY HER PRESENCE
  WITH THE INSTUCTOR ON THAT DAY IN ORDER TO AVOID BEING CHARGED WITH AN ABSENCE.

## **Classroom Etiquette**

# **Academic Honesty**

Academic honesty in the advancement of knowledge requires that all students and instructors respect the integrity of one another's work and recognize the important of acknowledging and safeguarding intellectual property.

There are many different forms of academic dishonesty. The following kinds of honesty violations and their definitions are not meant to be exhaustive. Rather, they are intended to serve as examples of unacceptable academic conduct.

- Plagiarism is taking and presenting as one's own the writings or ideas of others, without citing the source. You should understand the concept of plagiarism and keep it in mind when taking exams and preparing written materials. If you do not understand how to "cite a source" correctly, you must ask for help.
- Cheating is defined as fraud, deceit, or dishonesty in an academic assignment, or using or attempting to use materials, or assisting others in using materials that are prohibited or inappropriate in the context of the academic assignment in question.

Anyone caught cheating or plagiarizing will receive a zero (0) on the exam or assignment, and the instructor may report the incident to the Campus Disciplinary Officer, who may place related documentation in a file.
