Course Description: In this course, students refine and further develop beginning keyboard skills. This includes piano technique, major scales and arpeggios, sight-reading, chord progressions, and harmonization and transposition skills, as encountered in upper beginning/early intermediate piano music. (CSU, UC)

Prerequisite: -Must have taken and passed MUS 140 with a grade of "C" or better; or demonstrate the skills required to test out of MUS 140.

Student Learning Outcomes: Upon course completion, the successful student will have acquired new skills, knowledge, and or attitudes as demonstrated by being able to 1. Perform beginning level-2 pieces with correct pitches, rhythms, fingerings, hand position, at a reasonable tempo, with expressions indications observed (ILO1, ILO2, ILO4); 2. Perform at least 6 of the 12 major scales, with the RH and LH separately, up and down 3 octaves (ILO2, ILO4)

Course Objectives: Upon satisfactory completion of the course, students will be able to: 1. Play scale patters for at least 6 of the 12 major scales, and appropriate minor scales with separate hands; 2. Play primary and secondary major and minor chord progressions with both the right and left hand, ; 3. Accurately sight-read music of an appropriate skill level at the keyboard; 4. Demonstrate a knowledge of the elements of music – reading pitch, duration, dynamics, tempo, and expression; 5. Accurately transpose appropriate-level melodies and simple triadic harmonies; 6. Be able to accurately perform prepared Level 2 Solo and Ensemble repertoire for Concerts and Exams

Textbooks and References/Supplements: **1. Piano for Adults, Book 1, by Jane, Lisa and Lori Bastien, Newest Edition. Kjos Music Press, ISBN: 13:978-0711973008;** 2. Other special Piano Solo works assigned by Instructor, as well as Level-Appropriate Piano Ensemble Selections provided by Instructor; 3. Fun level-appropriate piano selections chosen by students from internet!

Class Requirements and Instructional Methods: Classes will entail short lectures, presentations, demonstrations; and videos on keyboard techniques, and piano performance, as suitable for the students' level of attainment/skill. Solos will be assigned, sight reading material will be given, scales and other technically facilitating materials will be given, as well as keyboard ensemble work. Likewise, the instructor will ensure that students learn and practice the appropriate functional music theory, as it is essential for fine keyboard learning. **Students must**

practice solos, ensemble works, scales, technical exercises, functional music theory, and sight-reading supervised AND UNSUPERVISED during class times. It is expected that students will do at least 3 hours of individual practice weekly, outside of class times, on their solos, technique work, scales and ensemble repertoire. Students will be required to perform their solo selections, scales, and ensemble pieces, weekly, and will be graded on their progress. **WRITTEN EXAMS (2):- Will be given on the Appropriate Music Theory (Music Writing) for each level of Piano Class. PERFORMANCE EXAMS (2):- Will take the form of 2 FUN Solo and Ensemble Recitals (Mid-Semester and End of Semester). PERFORMANCE QUIZZES(2):- Will take the form of Playing of Assigned Scales and Technical Exercises; as well as Sight-Reading Tests. Solo and Ensemble Concerts:- 1. Thursday October 17th, 2019 at 1:10pm; 2. Thursday December 5th, 2019 at 1:10pm.**

Class Attendance: A student who fails to attend the first meeting of a class or does not complete the first mandatory activity of an online class, will be dropped by the instructor as of the first official meeting of the class. Should readmission be desired, the student’s status will be the same as that of any other student who desires to add a class. It is the student’s responsibility to drop or officially withdraw from the class. See General catalog for details.

Regular attendance in all classes is expected of all students. A student whose continuous, unexcused absences exceed the number of hours the class is scheduled to meet per week, may be dropped.

Absences attributed to the representation of the college at officially approved events (conferences, contests, and field trips) will be counted as ‘excused’ absences.

Classroom Etiquette: Electronic Devices – Cell phones and electronic devices must be turned off and put away during class unless otherwise directed by the instructor. Online Netiquette: What is netiquette? Netiquette is Internet manners, online etiquette, and digital etiquette all rolled into one word. Netiquette is a set of rules for behaving properly online. Students must comply with these rules of netiquette: (1) identify yourself, (2) include a subject line, (3) avoid sarcasm, (4) respect others' opinions and privacy, (5) acknowledge and return messages promptly, (6) copy with caution, (7) do not spam or junk mail, (8) be concise, (9) use appropriate language, (10) use appropriate emoticons (emotional icons) to help convey meaning, and (11) use appropriate intensifiers to help convey meaning (do not use ALL CAPS or multiple exclamation marks (!!!))

Academic Honesty: Plagiarism – is to take and present as one's own the writings or ideas of others, without citing the source. You should understand the concept of plagiarism, and keep it in mind when taking exams, and preparing written materials. If you do not understand how to properly cite a source, you must ask for help. Cheating – is defined as fraud, deceit, or dishonesty in an academic assignment, or using or attempting to use materials, or assisting others in using materials, which are prohibited or inappropriate in the context of the academic assignment in question. Anyone caught cheating will receive a zero (0) on the exam or assignment, and the instructor may report the incident to the Campus Disciplinary Officer, who may place related documentation in a file. Repeated acts of cheating may result in an F in the course, and/or disciplinary action. Please refer to the General School catalog for more information on academic dishonesty or other misconduct.
