Course Description

Continuation of SPAN 220. It is designed for Heritage Speakers of Spanish to improve their writing, reading, and grammar skills. It focuses on the mastery of formal, written communication in Spanish at the intermediate-advanced level, while integrating authentic cultural and literary readings from Spanish speaking countries. The course focuses also on language challenges that Spanish speakers still encounter at intermediate-advanced level, such as orthography, the inappropriate mix of English and Spanish in specific contexts, and standard Spanish as contrasted with regional variations. This course is conducted entirely in Spanish. Emphasis on the conditional and the subjunctive forms. (CSU) (UC credit limited. See a counselor.)

Course Prerequisite(s) and/or Corequisite(s)

Spanish 220 or equivalent.

- 1. Understand and interpret written and spoken language on a variety of cultural topics and in works of literature and journalism in the target language. (ILO1, ILO2, ILO5)
- 2. Differentiate among the indicative and subjunctive moods. (ILO1, ILO2)
- 3. Successfully identify and differentiate between verb tenses in the subjunctive mood. (ILO1, ILO2)

Course Objectives

1. Demonstrate increased exposure to and mastery of the written Spanish language at an intermediateadvanced level.

- 2. Assess intermediate-advanced level readings in Spanish and demonstrate oral and written understanding by applying expository techniques such as summarizing, comparing, and contrasting.
- 3. Organize a short research paper on a selected literary or other culturally relevant theme in Spanish.
- 4. Differentiate between Hispanic and non-Hispanic customs, literature, traditions, art, and music in Spanish, orally and in writing, by applying grammar and vocabulary structures seen at the intermediateadvanced level as specified in the ACTFL [American Council of the Teaching of Foreign Languages] guidelines.
- 5. Examine the use of different registers of expression (formal, written, and oral) as well as the colloquial and dialectical forms in Spanish in order to construct diverse oral and/or written reports.

Prueba syllabus (clases online)

Exámenes:

Habrá 2 exámenes en clase. Un Midterm y un Examen Final. Ambos exámenes serán tomados a distancia. Midterm: domingo 16 de octubre

Final: viernes 11 de diciembre

Pruebas gramaticales:

El curso incluye varias pruebas gramaticales en <u>Canvas</u>. Las pruebas son a contrarreloj (es decir tienen 10 minutos <mark>para terminarlas) y solo podrán tomarlas una vez.</mark>

Actividades de práctica

En los módulos de aprendizaje habrá varias actividades de práctica. Éstas pueden ser prácticas gramaticales o pueden ser preguntas de comprensión sobre lecturas y cortometrajes. Las actividades de práctica de los módulos de gramática usted puede tomarlas hasta en 3 ocasiones. Las actividades de práctica en los módulos de Cultura, Literatura y Lectura y Comprensión sólo tendrá una oportunidad para hacerlas, pero puede pausarlas y regresar a ellas sin problema.

Asignaturas orales.

<mark>El estudiante tendrá dos asignaturas orales con el maestro</mark>, la videopresentación autobiográfica y la videoreseña. **Videopresentación:**

La primera de ellas será un video autobiográfico de entre 3-5 minutos de duración. El video será calificado según la corrección al hablar (gramática y ortografía), uso del registro lingüístico formal y la presencia de "Spanglish". No deberá leer su presentación, deberá mantener contacto con la cámara.

Videoreseña:

La segunda asignatura oral consistirá en un video en donde el estudiante grabará una reseña de un cuento que haya leído para este fin. El estudiante llenará una plantilla con preguntas sobre el cuento y después comentará la reseña por video. No deberá leer su videoreseña, debe aprender lo que dirá y mantener contacto con la cámara.

<u>Escritura</u>

En esta clase hay dos tipos de asignaturas escritas: "¡A Escribir!" y Los ensayos.

¡A Escribir!

Las asignaturas escritas llamadas "A Escribir" tienen un valor de 10 puntos, son semanales y están relacionadas con actividades y lecturas incluidas en los libros. Estas asignaturas (A Escribir) se encuentran en los módulos de escritura y deben enviarse a más tardar los viernes. Una vez que el maestro reciba la asignatura le señalará las faltas de ortografía por medio de símbolos de corrección), le asignará una calificación parcial y se la regresará al estudiante quien deberá hacer las correcciones necesarias y regresar la asignatura corregida para el domingo de esa misma semana. Si la asignatura no se corrige entonces se quedará la calificación parcial que el maestro asignó al primer envío. Hacia el final del semestre al estudiante se le perdonarán los dos envíos de ¡A Escribir! con las notas más bajas.

IMPORTANTE: Si no se envía el viernes entonces NO se califica y se pierden esos 10 puntos.

Ensayo o composición escrita:

Habrá tres ensayos a lo largo de la clase. Una carta de opinión, un ensayo descriptivo y un ensayo narrativo. Estos ensayos se enviarán por Canvas como documentos adjuntos en las fechas determinadas en el calendario. En el caso del ensayo descriptivo y el ensayo narrativo, tendrán que llevar una versión preliminar (borrador/"draft") con un tutor antes de enviar la versión final. Si el estudiante NO entrega un borrador entonces NO se aceptará la versión final del ensayo. Ningún ensayo será perdonado, por lo tanto es importante que entregue tanto los borradores como las versiones finales.

Discusión en clase:

Las discusiones semanales pueden encontrarse en los módulos de aprendizaje. Las discusiones serán sobre temas relacionados con actividades de los textos sobre los cuales los estudiantes tienen que opinar. Por cada tema, los estudiantes tienen que escribir su opinión y también comentar sobre la opinión de otro compañero en otras dos entradas. De esta manera tendrán que escribir tres entradas por tema semanalmente. La primera participación en la discusión debe hacerse para **el día jueves de cada semana**. Si su primera participación no está en la discusión para el jueves de esa semana perderá los puntos correspondientes. Sus otros dos comentarios a los compañero/as se vencen el domingo de esa semana.

Recuerde, la primera participación es su respuesta a la pregunta del profesor, debe tener por lo menos 150 palabras y se vence el jueves a las 11:59 pm. La segunda parte consta de dos comentarios a dos distintos compañeros de clase, cada uno de mis comentarios debe tener por lo menos 50 palabras y se vencen el domingo. Si su participación no aporta a la discusión, no recibirá puntos por su respuesta.

Si no envía su primera participación el jueves entonces NO se aceptarán los comentarios a los compañeros y perderán los 12 puntos posibles.

Repasos:

La maestra ofrecerá repasos en Zoom. Si los estudiantes lo solicitan, la maestra abrirá sesiones de repaso en Zoom antes de los exámenes o en cualquier momento durante el semestre.

ESTRUCTURA DEL CURSO ONLINE:	

Este curso está organizado en una lección preliminar y 5 lecciones más. Cada lección está divida en semanas y éstas incluyen módulos de aprendizaje. Los módulos de aprendizaje tienen 5 áreas divididas en:

- 1) Historia, cultura y sociedad
 - a. Contiene videos y lecturas sobre aspectos relevantes de los países de habla hispana.
- 2) Gramática y Ortografía
 - a. Contiene explicaciones gramaticales y ortográficas, así como ejercicios.
- 3) Cine y Literatura
 - a. Contiene cortometrajes y obras literarias y ejercicios de comprensión y análisis.
- 4) Lectura y comprensión
 - a. Contiene lecturas provenientes del texto y de periódicos de América Latina.
- 5) Escritura
 - a. Contiene ejercicios de escritura y ensayos.

En su conjunto, los módulos tienen la intención de desarrollar en el estudiante las 4 habilidades o destrezas lingüísticas necesarias para aprender un idioma: la escritura, la lectura, la habilidad auditiva y la destreza oral. A su vez, los módulos abarcan los "Institutional Learning Outcomes" y los "Program Learning Outcomes" con el fin de tener un acercamiento global en la formación del estudiante.

What does it mean to "attend" an online class?

Attendance is critical to student success and for IVC to use federal aid funds. Acceptable indications of attendance are:

Classroom Etiquette

How do I act differently if I have an on-ground class during COVID?

1. DO NOT COME TO CAMPUS OR ATTEND AN OFF-CAMPUS CLASS IF YOU FEEL SICK, HAVE A FEVER, OR HAVE A COUGH

- a. Even if your symptoms are mild, <u>stay home.</u>
- b. Email your instructor to explain why you are missing class.
- c. If you are sick with COVID-19 or think you might have COVID-19, provides CDC guidance.
- d. If you have tested positive for COVID-19, you must self-quarantine for 14 days and then be without symptoms for at least 72 hours. Clearance is required prior to returning to any face-to-face interaction. It is recommended that you undergo a final COVID-19 test to confirm that you are no longer infected.
- If you are exposed through direct contact with a person known to be COVID-19 positive, then you must submit negative COVID-19 test results prior to returning to any face-to-face interaction.
- 2. ARRIVE AT CAMPUS EARLY (at least 15 minutes early is advised).
 - a. All people entering the IVC campus will need to pass a screening process, which will occur at the gates as your drive onto campus. You will need to take a short questionnaire and get

your temperature taken (the screening is completely touchless and will take place while you remain in your car).

- 3. BRING A MASK TO CLASS (and always wear it).
 - a. Be sure that your mask covers both your nose and mouth. If your mask is cloth, then wash it each day. If your mask is disposable, then use a new one each day.
- 4. GO DIRECTLY TO YOUR CLASSROOM.
 - a. The IVC campus is mostly closed so you should not visit other areas or seek any face-to-face services. Services are available to students online and can be accessed through www.imperial.edu.
- 5. WASH YOUR HANDS FREQUENTLY (and use the provided sanitation supplies).
 - a. Your classroom is equipped with cleaning supplies. Use them as needed.

6. BE SURE TO SOCIAL DISTANCE (stay at least 6 feet from other).

a. The number of students in a classroom at any one time is very limited so you have plenty of space to spread and ensure that you stay at least 6 feet from others.

7. BRING YOUR OWN FOOD AND DRINKS.

a. There is no food service currently offered on campus.

Online Netiquette

- What is netiquette? Netiquette is internet manners, online etiquette, and digital etiquette all rolled into one word. Basically, netiquette is a set of rules for behaving properly online.
- Students are to comply with the following rules of netiquette: (1) identify yourself, (2) include a subject line, (3) avoid sarcasm, (4) respect others' opinions and privacy, (5) acknowledge and return messages promptly, (6) copy with caution, (7) do not spam or junk mail, (8) be concise, (9) use appropriate language, (10) use appropriate emoticons (emotional icons) to help convey meaning, and (11) use appropriate intensifiers to help convey meaning [do not use ALL CAPS or multiple exclamation marks (!!!!)].

How am I expected to act in an online "classroom" (especially Zoom)?

Attending a virtual meeting can be a challenge when there are many students on one conference call. Participating in such meetings may count as class attendance, but disruptive behavior may also result in you not being admitted to future meetings. Follow the tips below for best results:

1) Be RESPECTFUL

a. Your written, verbal, and non-verbal communications should be respectful and focused on the learning topics of the class.

2) Find a QUIET LOCATION & SILENCE YOUR PHONE (if zooming)

a. People walking around and pets barking can be a distraction.

3) EAT AT A DIFFERENT TIME.

- a. Crunching food or chugging drinks is distracting for others.
- b. Synchronous zoom times are set in advance so reserve meals for outside class meetings.

4) ADJUST YOUR LIGHTING SO THAT OTHERS CAN SEE YOU

- a. It is hard to see you in dim lighting so find a location with light.
- b. If your back is to a bright window, you will be what is called "backlit" and not only is it hard on the eyes (glare) but you look like a silhouette.

5) POSITION THE CAMERA SO THAT YOUR FACE AND EYES ARE SHOWING

- a. If you are using the camera, show your face; it helps others see your non-verbal cues.
- b. You may be at home, but meeting in pajamas or shirtless is not appropriate so dress suitably. Comb your hair, clean your teeth, fix your clothes, etc. before your meeting time to show self-respect and respect for others.

6) Be READY TO LEARN AND PAY ATTENTION

- a. Catch up on other emails or other work later.
- b. If you are Zooming, silence your phone and put it away.
- c. If you are in a room with a TV turn it off.

7) USE YOUR MUTE BUTTON WHEN IN LOUD PLACES OR FOR DISTRACTIONS

 Pets barking, children crying, sneezing, coughing, etc. can happen unexpectedly. It's best if you conference in a private space, but if you can't find a quiet place, when noises arise MUTE your laptop.

8) REMEMBER TO UNMUTE WHEN SPEAKING

- a. Follow your instructor's directions about using the "raise hand" icon or chat function to be recognized and to speak, but make sure you have unmuted your device.
- b. Do not speak when someone else is speaking.

9) REMAIN FOCUSED AND PARTICIPATE IN THE MEETING

- a. Especially when the camera is on YOU, we can all see your actions. Engage in the meeting. Look at the camera. Listen to instruction. Answer questions when asked.
- b. Do not use the Zoom meeting to meet with your peers or put on a "show" for them.

10) PAUSE YOUR VIDEO IF MOVING OR DOING SOMETHING DISTRACTING

a. Emergencies happen. If you need to leave the room or get up and move about, stop your video.

Academic Honesty

Academic honesty in the advancement of knowledge requires that all students and instructors respect the integrity of one another's work and recognize the important of acknowledging and safeguarding intellectual property.

There are many different forms of academic dishonesty. The following kinds of honesty violations and their definitions are not meant to be exhaustive. Rather, they are intended to serve as examples of unacceptable academic conduct.

- Plagiarism is taking and presenting as one's ow
- n the writings or ideas of others, without citing the source. You should understand the concept of plagiarism and keep it in mind when taking exams and preparing written materials. If you do not understand how to "cite a source" correctly, you must ask for help.
- Cheating is defined as fraud, deceit, or dishonesty in an academic assignment, or using or attempting to use materials, or assisting others in using materials that are prohibited or inappropriate in the context of the academic assignment in question.

Anyone caught cheating or plagiarizing will receive a zero (0) on the exam or assignment, and the instructor may report the incident to the Campus Disciplinary Officer, who may place related documentation in a file.

Repeated acts of cheating may result in an F in the course and/or disciplinary action. Please refer to the General Catalog for more information on academic dishonesty or other misconduct. Acts of cheating include, but are not limited to, the following: (a) plagiarism; (b) copying or attempting to copy from others during an examination or on an assignment; (c) communicating test information with another person during an examination; (d) allowing others to do an assignment or portion of an assignment; (e) using a commercial term paper service.

How do I show academic honesty and integrity in an online "classroom"?

• KEEP YOUR PASSWORDS CONFIDENTIAL.

- You have a unique password to access online software like Canvas. Never allow someone else to log-in to your account.
- COMPLETE YOUR OWN COURSEWORK.
 - When you register for an online class and log-in to Canvas, you do so with the understanding that you will produce your own work, take your own exams, and <u>will do so</u> without the assistance of others (unless directed by the instructor).

Examples of Academic Dishonesty that can occur in an online environment:

- Copying from others on a quiz, test, examination, or assignment;
- Allowing someone else to copy your answers on a quiz, test, exam, or assignment;
- Having someone else take an exam or quiz for you;
- Conferring with others during a test or quiz (if the instructor didn't explicitly say it was a group project, then he/she expects you to do the work without conferring with others);
- Buying or using a term paper or research paper from an internet source or other company or taking any work of another, even with permission, and presenting the work as your own;
- Excessive revising or editing by others that substantially alters your final work;
- Sharing information that allows other students an advantage on an exam (such as telling a peer what to expect on a make-up exam or prepping a student for a test in another section of the same class);
- Taking and using the words, work, or ideas of others and presenting any of these as your own work is plagiarism. This applies to all work generated by another, whether it be oral, written, or artistic work. Plagiarism may either be deliberate or unintentional.

Also under the umbrella of EOPS is the CARE (Cooperative Agency Resources for Education) Program, designed to serve single parents and assist with addressing issues that are particular to this population. Students that are single parents receiving TANF/Cash Aid assistance may qualify for our CARE program. Student Equity Program

The SEA Program also houses IVC's Homeless Liaison, Foster Youth Liaison, Formerly Incarcerated Liaison, and Military Affiliated Liaison, who provide direct services and referrals to students in need. SEA strives to empower students experiencing insecurities related to food, housing, transportation, textbooks, and shower access. We recognize that students who struggle meeting their basic needs are also at an academic and economic disadvantage, creating barriers to academic success and wellness. We strive to remove barriers that affect IVC students' access to enrollment, education, degree and certificate completion, and the ability to transfer to a university. SEA also provides outreach at local Imperial County high schools to ensure graduating seniors are successfully matriculated into the college and have a strong support system.
