Course Description

This lab class offers intensive instruction in writing, research, reading, and critical thinking skills to promote success in a concurrent English 110 course. This course allows a qualified student to bypass English 009. This course follows the freshman composition co-requisite model of acceleration.

(Nontransferable, nondegree applicable)

English 55, a lab support course, is paired with English 110. English 55 is designed to assist students in completing their homework assignments and essay assignments for this class. Enrolling in English 110 with the support course English 55 allows students to bypass English 009. However, students who have qualified for English 110, but feel they could use

more support in English composition, will also benefit from taking the paired courses. Both courses are graded separately. English 110 follows the traditional grading scale and English 55 is pass/no pass.

Student Learning Outcomes

Upon satisfactory completion of the course, students will be able to:

- 1. Students will be able to write an expository essay that demonstrates competence in both form and content. The essay will:
- 1) address the writing task
- 2) be organized
- 3) use details and examples to support the thesis and 4) demonstrate facility with grammar and syntax.

Course Objectives

Upon satisfactory completion of the course, students will be able to:

1. Critically read, analyze, and evaluate a variety of primarily non-fiction texts for content and

context.

2. Utilize appropriate pre- and post-reading strategies to analyze patterns of organization within a

variety of texts.

- 3. Write grammatically correct sentences that adhere to conventions of written English.
- 4. Integrate the ideas of others through paraphrasing, summarizing, and quoting utilizing appropriate MLA format and guidelines.
- 5. Compose, evaluate, and edit an essay with an introduction, body, and conclusion, which includes organizing an essay around a controlling idea and developing main idea paragraphs with effective use of supporting details.

Course Requirements and Instructional Methods

In-class work/homework: The lab assignments in each class are designed to improve and enhance the writing skills necessary to pass English 110. These assignments will be used to build or revise work from the English 110 class.

Course Grading Based on Course Objectives

Assignments are completed during each class and points given according to the work done. Arriving late/leaving early for a significant amount of time will result in receiving zero (0) points for the day as work may not get finished in time or appropriately. An absence—excused or unexcused—results in a grade of zero (0) for the day.

At times, the lab class may be used as a review session, one-on-one time with instructor/tutor, or optional. HOWEVER, any of these changes to a usual lab class will be clearly explained ahead of time; you do not get to choose how you're using the class.

Attendance

Academic Honesty

Academic honesty in the advancement of knowledge requires that all students and instructors respect the integrity of one another's work and recognize the important of acknowledging and safeguarding intellectual property.

There are many different forms of academic dishonesty. The following kinds of honesty violations and their definitions are not meant to be exhaustive. Rather, they are intended to serve as examples of unacceptable academic conduct.

- Plagiarism is taking and presenting as one's own the writings or ideas of others, without citing the source. You should understand the concept of plagiarism and keep it in mind when taking exams and preparing written materials. If you do not understand how to "cite a source" correctly, you must ask for help.
- Cheating is defined as fraud, deceit, or dishonesty in an academic assignment, or
 using or attempting to use materials, or assisting others in using materials that are
 prohibited or inappropriate in the context of the academic assignment in question.
