Course Objectives

- 9. Demonstrate basic nursing skills: infection control, hand washing, vital signs intake and output, patient safety, bed-making, bathing, positioning patient in bed, transferring patient using proper body mechanics.

- 11. Review the ANA code of ethics for nurses and discuss pertinent ethical and legal concepts

Lecture Class Meeting:

NUR 80 will be conducted in a hybrid manner. Dr. Ortiz will discuss the schedule on Day 1 for NUR 80 Summer 2021. Class meetings will take place virtually through Confer Zoom. This will be a synchronous class meeting, which means ALL enrolled students will be present for class at the regularly scheduled time: Monday 08:00hrs – 12:00hrs & Tuesday 08:00hrs – 1300hrs. The following guidelines will be enforced:

- 1. Students must be logged into the Zoom classroom by 0755hrs with the web camera on. Attendance will begin promptly at 0800hrs. The student must be logged into the Zoom class using a webcam to be considered 'present'. Students will have their audio muted upon entering the Zoom classroom. All NUR 80 students will be in plain a red polo shirt and black straight leg scrub pants or the designated uniform outlined in RN student handbook for all class meetings. Attendance will be taken frequently throughout the Zoom classroom session, any student who is not present at any portion of the class will be considered tardy. Students who must leave the classroom early, need to notify the instructor well in advance using the IVC email or via by Zoom chat during a class session. Do not 'leave the meeting' before being dismissed by the instructor.
- 2. Any student who is not 'present' at any attendance activity will be considered tardy. Two episodes of tardiness equals one absence. The absenteeism policy will be followed with a case-by-case consideration.
- 3. If you are not 'in class', please notify the instructor before class begins. If you miss class, you will be responsible for the material covered. You will be able to follow the PowerPoint slides during lecture. Pauses during lecture will occur to allow time for questions. Students may type questions into the chat link at any time. At the question point, the instructor will review questions posted and respond.
- 4. During the lecture, all students will have their audio muted. This will minimize the background noise or students talking over the instructor or each other.
- 5. Not all unit content will be covered via virtual classroom lectures. You will still be expected to review any other material assigned.

Out of Class Assignments: The Department of Education policy states that one (1) credit hour is the amount of student work that reasonably approximates not less than one hour of class time and two (2) hours of out-of-class time per week over the span of a semester. WASC has adopted a similar requirement.

Career possibilities in Nursing:

Work-based learning (WBL) allows students to apply classroom content in professional settings while gaining real-world experiences. These opportunities will provide you with a deeper, more engaging and relevant learning environment. This semester, I will be offering the following WBL activities in order to provide you with the opportunity to explore career options in Nursing.

- Research-Based and Field Experience: learning research skills or exploring the natural world, support critical
 thinking in the collection and use of data, and provide opportunities to apply knowledge learned in the classroom
 to the real world outside of school.
- **Simulated workplace experience**: Allows student to develop and apply their skills in the context of industry standards and expectations. Simulated experiences may be valuable when experiences in real work settings are not possible, due to logistical or other constraints.
- **Guest Speakers**: Guest speakers provide an opportunity for students to hear firsthand about a particular occupation, the necessary preparation and required knowledge the occupation requires, and other interesting information from a current practitioner in that field

Attendance

- A student who fails to attend the first meeting of a class or does not complete the first mandatory activity of an
 online class will be dropped by the instructor as of the first official meeting of that class. It is the student's

- Regular attendance in all classes is expected of all students. A student whose continuous, unexcused absence

The student will meet with the teaching team to discuss the situation and will be considered for dismissal.
- Students who are late to class three times in any nursing course will be considered absent for one day. Class includes any modality offered: lecture, clinical, and skills lab.

- What is netiquette? Netiquette is internet manners, online etiquette, and digital etiquette all rolled into one word. Basically, netiquette is a set of rules for behaving properly online.
- Always follow the IVC nursing student code of conduct, professional behavior and social media guidelines and policies outlined in the RN student handbook.
- A. General guidelines for distance education/on-line learning class meeting:
- Be mindful that when using the webcam/camera, everyone can see everyone else. Wear proper attire-(this is full uniform as noted above).
- Students need to show real-time images. No pictures, photos, or virtual backgrounds. We ask that you join the class meeting by computer, laptop, or tablet and not by phone.
- Make every attempt to secure daycare arrangements for children, assure pets are fed/walked, and family knows that you are 'in class'.
- Cell phones should be on silent and no texting or web surfing during class.
- We will provide several break times during class meetings. You will not need to log off. You can step away from the computer, but please be back and ready at the time given.
- If you have connection problems, please reach out to your instructor by chat, text, email, or as specified. You will need a fairly reliable internet for virtual learning. Any students who require additional assistance with electronic devices (internet-WiFI Hotspot) are asked to reach out to the instructor for assistance.
- This may be a new experience for you but it is our new norm at the Imperial Valley College. Please be patient with yourself, each other, and your instructors.
