Course Description

This course surveys various psychological research methods with an emphasis on research design, experimental procedures, descriptive methods, instrumentation, and the collection, analysis, interpretation, and reporting of research data. Research design and methodology will be examined through a review of research in a variety of the sub disciplines of psychology. (C-ID PSY 200) (CSU, UC)

Course Prerequisite(s) and/or Corequisite(s)

Recommended: Twelfth grade reading level is highly recommended.

Upon course completion, the successful student will have acquired new skills, knowledge, and or attitudes as demonstrated by being able to:

- 1. Identify and evaluate the various types of research methods used in psychology. (ILO2, ILO3, ILO5)
- 2. Write a research proposal and literature review in correct APA format. (ILO1, ILO2, ILO3)
- 3. Perform a literature search using electronic databases that provide psychological journal articles. (ILO4, ILO2, ILO3, ILO5)

Course Objectives

Upon satisfactory completion of the course, students will be able to:

- 1. describe the basic research approaches and design methods required in behavioral sciences.
- 2. summarize behavioral science abstracts
- 3. analyze behavioral science studies to identify methodological flaws and/or unfounded conclusions.
- 4. identify appropriate elementary statistical techniques for use in quantitative studies.

- 5. conduct a review of relevant research literature.
- 6. explain ethical issues pertaining to research with animal and human participants.
- 7. construct a pilot study.
- 8. write a research report, using acceptable APA formatting.

Course Requirements and Instructional Methods

Students are expected to comply with the following classroom norms:

Method of evaluation: Class activities, attendance, homework, quizzes, problem solving exercise, and written assignments.

Out-of-class

Written position statements on subjects that are chosen by the professor and/or student and relevant to course. Research would be done via internet to show information literacy and competency in finding acceptable sources such as peer-reviewed journal articles. Students will be asked to conduct research projects in class and outside of class. For example, students might be asked to obtain participants to fill out surveys and/or volunteer for experimental research. Students might also be asked to participate in naturalistic observation type research out in the community.

Reading and Writing

Reading assignments include assigned text readings; current articles and/or sources from the internet. A written and/or verbal critical analysis of the research will be required. Written assignments include reflective responses, sharing the student's viewpoints and opinions in regard to course material. Research papers on class based psychological research projects, in APA style, are required

Discussions: Each module has a discussion board. Students must participate in each discussion in the form of one original post, and one response post per module. Original posts must contain at least 150 words, and response posts must contain 50 words to receive full credit. Discussion posts are due at each module's due date. Late posts may be considered for partial credit.

Research Assignments: You will be provided with and/or asked to conduct a literature search for various research articles that align with the various types of research designs discussed in your textbook. You will be provided with critical thinking questions in which to analyze and evaluate the article. Questions are to be answered in the following format: double-spaced, size 12 font, and 1inch margins. Each research assignment will be worth 25 points. Late research assignments will be accepted up to one class period of the due date.

APA Research Paper Structure: You will produce a draft(s) of each component in an APA style research paper for practice purposes. We will discuss the structure for each section in class and use research articles and/or data to prepare for your final paper. The draft for each section will be worth 10 points. No drafts will be accepted after the Research Paper due date.

Research Paper: There will be a research paper due at the end of the semester in which you will work individually or with a partner to demonstrate your ability to design a research project, collect data, and write up the results of the research in the correct APA format. The paper will include a Title Page, an Abstract, an Introduction (literature review) of the research topic, a Method section, a Results section, a Discussion section, and a Reference page. Graphs, charts and figures can also be included. The paper will be worth 100 points. Late research papers will result in a loss of 10 points each day after the due date. Research Presentation.

Exams: Two (2) exams will be given. Exams could consist of multiple choice, fill in the blank, short answer and essay questions from the class material. No make-up exams will be given unless you have called me PRIOR to the exam and let me know you will not be able to take the exam. If you contact me prior to the exam, you will have one week to make-up the exam. Each exam will be worth 100 points.

Out of Class Assignments: The Department of Education policy states that one (1) credit hour is the amount of student work that reasonably approximates not less than one hour of class time and two (2) hours of out-of-class time per week over the span of a semester. WASC has adopted a similar requirement.

Attendance

Academic Honesty
