Course Description

Techniques used for brief therapy crisis intervention, intake interviewing and referral will be studied and practiced. Special attention will be given to the process of intervention, admitting, and recording of information as it pertains to persons in crisis including alcohol and drug abuse clients. Through an experiential format, participants will learn and practice skills in brief therapy, different levels of client communication, and intake interviewing. (CSU)

- 4. Recognize the substance abuses including major traits and problems in the initial interviewing sessions and special interviewing skills;
- 5. Define crisis intervention and problem solving;



- 6. Identify information and referral techniques;
- 7. Evaluate community resources and the process of making an effective referral follow-up and identify stresses of the helping profession;
