Course Description

Course Description: The standard course in freshman English. The course seeks to improve the student's ability to understand serious and complex prose and to improve the student's ability to write an exposition that is thoughtful and clear, including the production of a well-documented research paper. (CSU, UC)

Student Learning Outcomes

Upon course completion, the successful student will have acquired new skills, knowledge, and or attitudes as demonstrated by being able to:

- 1. Demonstrate mastery of research strategies, including appropriate use and correct documentation of research materials (ILO1, ILO4, ILO5)
- 2. Demonstrate mastery of pre-writing strategies, including brainstorming and outlining (ILO1, ILO2)
- 3. Develop an essay of multiple pages that effectively presents and strongly supports a thesis statement. (ILO1, ILO2)
- 4. Demonstrate command of rules regarding plagiarism and academic ethics. (ILO3)

Course Objectives

Upon satisfactory completion of the course, students will be able to:

- 1. Read, analyze, and interpret a variety of written texts, including one single-author text.
- 2. Identify evidence, tone, purpose, and audience, and fallacies in a variety of written works.
- 3. Demonstrate a thorough understanding of the writing process, from development and drafting to revising and editing.
- 4. Demonstrate a command of varying writing patterns, such as comparison and contrast, definition, and argumentation.
- 5. Demonstrate an understanding of connotative and figurative language while writing for an academic audience.
- 6. Adapt writing strategies to the requirements of the writing situation (e.g., to essay exam or other timed writing, research writing, reflective writing)



- 7. Examine and analyze their own writing and that of other students with a view towards improving the effectiveness of the written work.
- 8. Develop text analysis and interpretation supported by citations, synthesized with the study and application of documentation styles and library skills (including electronic databases) to produce a research paper.
- 9. Demonstrate an understanding of the writing process by writing at least four essays using a variety of rhetorical modes, along with one research paper, composing a total of 8,000-10,000 words. Expository and argumentative papers constitute the bulk of student writing. However, revisions, summaries, journals, or other assigned writing may be used to meet the requirement.
- 10. Participate in a number of activities and areas of study as deemed appropriate by the instructor.

Course Policies

Essay Grading Policy

- Essays are graded on a percent of 100.
- Grade reflects the overall quality of the work turned in, how complete the work is and whether the instructions from the assignment were properly followed.
- A rubric will be used to grade each essay.
- Missing or unsatisfactory work will be scored "no credit." This is a 0 (F) and averaged into your grade.
- Essays that do not follow the prompt instructions will receive a 0 (F).
- Late essays are not accepted.

The course is divided into units, at the end of each unit, you will complete an essay. Every easy is a research essay which means that you will use outside sources. Each essay is an opportunity for you to showcase the skills you have learned throughout the unit. Here are the essays you'll complete this semester:

- Essay 1: Narrative Essay
- Essay 2: Definition Essay
- Essay 3: Compare & Contrast Essay
- Essay 4: Literary Analysis Essays

Late Work Policy

Late work interrupts the flow of learning in this course, and could cause serious problems. Discussions, in particular, are designed to be interactive--the feedback you give to and get from your peers is just as valuable as any feedback you will receive from me. For this reason, late work is discouraged, and some late work will not be accepted. Late work will receive a 10% deduction per day; late work submitted after 3 days late will not be accepted.

If an emergency arises, such as illness or a family emergency, please let me know ASAP. I can't reiterate



enough that your success is my central goal, but your success also involves a partnership between you and me that is supported by strong communication.

Feedback Policy

- I will provide feedback to you for all assignments and graded discussions within one week of the due date.
- I will be using a rubric to grade your assignments and discussions.
- I will add comments and annotations to your submitted files.

Attendance and Participation Policy

This is a live synchronous, on-ground course. You do have the option to either attend the course on campus (at IVC) or log on on Zoom. Your participation is based on your attendance and participation in class. If you are attending the course on Zoom you will need a microphone and a camera. At times, cameras will be required to be turned on. Your assignments, handouts, and textbook will be on Canvas.

Add/Drop Policy
