

- 3. Identify major psychological disorders, key symptoms, and the main strategies used for treatment (IL01, IL02, IL03, IL05).




Course Objectives

- 6. discuss the processes by which humans learn and store new skills and information.
- 7. discuss major theories of personality, their assumptions and implications.
- 8. outline the symptoms, causes, and treatments of common psychological disorders.

Course Requirements and Instructional Methods

This syllabus serves as a guide to the class and may be altered throughout the semester. Students officially enrolled must access the course using Canvas through the IVC homepage. The course is being offered asynchronously meaning that all coursework, communications, and other interactions take place over the internet. Reliable internet access and the ability to log in the Canvas site is crucial to your success in the course. There will likely be something for you to do each day for the class. Generally, you will receive an email notification if something on Canvas requires your attention, nonetheless it would be wise to regularly check the site for changes. The course is broken up into modules. Each

module represents a chunk of information for you to learn. Within each module, there will be tasks for you to perform such as watch videos and recorded lectures, view PowerPoint slides, complete other assignments and take guizzes. The modules will become available sequentially as you move through the course. Some of the activities in the modules like guizzes will have clear due dates associated with them. These activities must be completed by those due dates and in the time allotted. Questions will come from the material covered in the modules, the textbook and any other supplementary material provided. The majority of what you need to know for guizzes is explicitly covered in the modules although small portions may not be. You are still responsible for knowing the material from each chapter in its entirety unless otherwise specified. It is your responsibility to pay attention to the due dates for guizzes and assignments as they are made available. Weekly module guizzes will be made available on Fridays and are due the following Monday. Also, be prepared for smaller quizzes (about 1-2 per week) that need to be complete as you go through the module. You will not be able to make up missed guizzes and assignments without penalty. If you miss any assignment, you can submit it as you normally would in Canvas with a 10% per day late penalty. So after 10 days any assignment submitted receives a zero. No work will be accepted over email. Everything must be submitted through the Canvas LMS. If you find that you are having difficulty with the course, you can seek additional assistance (see below). In addition, if you need special accommodations for anything let me know in advance.

Course Grading Based on Course Objectives

Final grades are based on points accumulated over the entire semester. An <u>approximate</u> grade/point breakdown is shown below.

Attendance & Participation

A student who fails to attend the first meeting of a class or does not complete the first mandatory activity of an online class will be dropped by the instructor as of the first official meeting of that class. Should

- Regular attendance in all classes is expected of all students. A student whose continuous, unexcused absence exceed the number of hours the class is scheduled to meet per week may be dropped. For online courses, students who fail to complete required activities for two consecutive weeks may be considered to have excessive absences and may be dropped.
- Absences attributed to the representation of the college at officially approved events (conferences, contests, and field trips) will be counted as 'excused' absences.

Classroom Etiquette

- Electronic Devices: Cell phones and electronic devices must be turned off and put away during class, unless otherwise directed by the instructor.

Online Netiquette

- What is netiquette? Netiquette is internet manners, online etiquette, and digital etiquette all rolled into one word. Basically, netiquette is a set of rules for behaving properly online.
- Students are to comply with the following rules of netiquette: (1) identify yourself, (2) include a subject line, (3) avoid sarcasm, (4) respect others' opinions and privacy, (5) acknowledge and return messages promptly, (6) copy with caution, (7) do not spam or junk mail, (8) be concise, (9) use appropriate language, (10) use appropriate emoticons (emotional icons) to help convey meaning, and (11) use appropriate intensifiers to help convey meaning [do not use ALL CAPS or multiple exclamation marks (!!!!)].

Academic Honesty

Academic honesty in the advancement of knowledge requires that all students and instructors respect the integrity of one another's work and recognize the important of acknowledging and safeguarding intellectual property. There are many different forms of academic dishonesty. The following kinds of honesty violations and their definitions are not meant to be exhaustive. Rather, they are intended to serve as examples of unacceptable academic conduct.

- Plagiarism is taking and presenting as one's own the writings or ideas of others, without citing the source. You should understand the concept of plagiarism and keep it in mind when taking exams and preparing written materials. If you do not understand how to "cite a source" correctly, you must ask for help.
- Cheating is defined as fraud, deceit, or dishonesty in an academic assignment, or using or attempting to use materials, or assisting others in using materials that are prohibited or inappropriate in the context of the academic assignment in question.

Anyone caught cheating or plagiarizing will receive a zero (0) on the exam or assignment, and the instructor may report the incident to the Campus Disciplinary Officer, who may place related documentation in a file. Repeated acts of cheating may result in an F in the course and/or disciplinary action.
