## **Course Description**

The study of watercolor painting with emphasis upon color, composition, and pictorial expression. Exploration of various techniques employing the medium of watercolor. Additional materials fee applies. (CSU/UC)

## Course Prerequisite(s) and/or Corequisite(s)

None.

### **Student Learning Outcomes**

Upon course completion, the successful student will have acquired new skills, knowledge, and or attitudes as demonstrated by being able to:

- 1. Develop portfolio of watercolor paintings.
- 2. Present, discuss and critique watercolor paintings in a coherent manner.
- 3. Describe a famous watercolor painting, analyze it, and interpret it in a 600-900 word essay.

### **Course Objectives**

Upon satisfactory completion of the course, students will be able to:

- 1. Recognize contemporary and historic usage of watercolor.
- 2. Identify the materia1s and equipment, boards, papers, brushes, and pigments necessary for watercolor painting.
- 3. Experiment with color properties, color theory, hues, values, saturation, intensities, as well as transparency and opacity.
- 4. Experiment with fluidity of the watercolor medium, wash control, wash composition, and the application of glazes using a variety of subject matter such as still life, landscape, figurative, architectural, and imaginative.
- 5. Develop watercolor compositions emp1oying balance, harmony, value contrasts.
- 6. Employ complementary, split complementary, triadic, and analogous color harmonies in completed watercolor assignments.
- 7. Interpret the use of other media in conjunction with waterco1ors co11age, ink, pastels, Conte crayons, and a variety of papers.
- 8. Present several final compositions using individual techniques, properly matted for a final critique.

## **Course Requirements and Instructional Methods**

Instructional methods include Discussion, Group Activities, Individual Assistance, Lab Activities, Lecture, Audio Visual presentations, and Demonstrations.

Students are expected to spend a minimum of three hours per unit per week in class and on outside assignments, prorated for short-term classes. There will be one 600-900 word essay required. A minimum of three hours per week of outside work on the assigned projects will be required.

Students are responsible for idea generation for their paintings, including preliminary drawings, photographs, gathering other visual sources.

Out of Class Assignments: The Department of Education policy states that one (1) credit hour is the amount of student work that reasonably approximates not less than one hour of class time and two (2) hours of out-of-class time per week over the span of a semester. WASC has adopted a similar requirement.

Lab Fee: The student lab fees go towards some paint, watercolor paper, palettes, brushes and other miscellaneous supplies.

You may wish to have:

A sketchbook for watercolor, no smaller than 8 1/2 by 11 inches, but can be larger.

A #2 pencil and eraser for use in your sketchbook and to layout subject matter for paintings.

You might want an old shirt or apron to wear to protect your clothing. Don't wear precious clothing to class as watercolor paint can stain clothes.

A bag or tackle box to keep everything in.

Reliable mail order: This is the most economical way to purchase art supplies, even considering possible shipping costs. Call for catalogs.

Blick and Jerry's often have free shipping with a minimum purchase. You do not pay tax if you purchase from Jerry's because they don't have a store in California; however, there is a Blick store in San Diego, so they do



collect tax from mail order. Both have frequent sales. Get on their email list. Call to request catalogs.

## **Course Grading Based on Course Objectives**

**Portfolio:** Paintings, as required from each assignment, will be graded as a group at Midterm and for Final at the end of the semester. (See class projects in the daily plan.)

Required Midterm and Final Portfolio review: At the middle and end of the semester, the instructor will meet with each student and grade all the work completed.

- NOTE: If you miss the Midterm portfolio review, expect this to drop your grade by one half grade for each class after the two designated classes for reviews until you make an appointment for the review.
- If you miss the Final portfolio review, your grade may drop as a result of undocumented classwork.

Portfolio Grading Rubric - Portfolio Grades will be based on these factors based on the use of watercolor (400 points possible):

- Appropriateness to assignment and completeness (100 points)
- Exploration with watercolor hues, saturation, intensities, transparency, opacity, textures, blends, color theory, etc. (100 points possible);
- Effective use of technique (fluidity, washes, glazes, textures) 100 points possible;
- Composition (balance, harmony, value contrast) 100 points possible;

### Week 1:

**Jan. 3, Monday:** Introduction to the class. Supply packets passed out. DVD - Watercolor Workout with Jean Haines.

**Jan. 4, Tuesday:** Introduction to watercolor materials, techniques, and color theory. Exploration of lifting methods: blotting, sandpaper, razor blades, wiping, etc. and resist techniques, wax, mask-it, crayon, tape. Practice washes, flat wash on dry paper, flat wash on wet paper, gradated wash on wet paper, graded wash on dry paper, granulated wash, lifting, wet-into-wet diffusions. Get to know your brushes. Make color texture swatches. Overnight assignment: find a simple silhouette you can cut out - think small and bold without details, like child hand prints. Bring your idea to class tomorrow. Bring Exacto knives or scissors, if possible.

**Jan. 5, Wednesday:** Homage to Matisse: Watercolor abstracted painting collages using textures and washes you created.

**Jan. 6, Thursday:** Critique collage. DVD – Tom Lynch techniques. Assignment: Window or doorway motif: making use of a vista by utilizing value -- light and dark. Paint forms showing direction of light source, shadow, reflected light and shadow. Consider using harmonic colors. Try open and closed composition to find an effective use of placement. Think of the passageways as escape routes for the mind, leading from one feeling or thought to another.



Jan. 7, Friday: Work on window/doorway paintings.

### Week 2:

Jan. 10, Monday: Finish painting(s). Essay assigned. We may have a trip to the library.

Jan. 11, Tuesday: Critique window and door paintings. Ann Pember's Vibrant Orchid DVD.

**Jan. 12, Wednesday:** Bring your own objects or subject for this to create your own composition and work from your own drawing or photo, thinking about layering color and combining at least three techniques.

Jan. 13, Thursday: Finish up paintings.

Jan. 14, Friday: Critique. Individual projects. Book project bound with Japanese stitch.

#### Week 3:

Jan. 17, Monday: Martin Luther King, Jr. Day, campus closed.

Jan. 18, Tuesday: Book project bound with Japanese stitch.

Jan. 19, Wednesday: Individual projects and/or books continued. MIDTERM: Portfolio reviews: Upload images of your work to assignment in Canvas.

Jan. 20, Thursday: Critique Individual Projects and/or book assignment. DVDs - Art 21: Season One, Shahzia Sikander and Season Three: Laylah Ali. Mixed media. New Assignment: Mixed Media via sketches or your own (not Internet) photos; color as expression of mood. Use watercolor combined with other mediums such as gouache, transfer, collage, oil and soft pastels, color pencils, acrylic, etc. Consider nontraditional color; that is, not blue sky and green grass. Imagine a color scheme and create a painting.

Jan. 21, Friday: Mixed media projects assignment continued.

### Week 4:

Jan. 24, Monday: Mixed media projects assignment continued.

Jan. 25, Tuesday: Mixed media projects assignment completed.

Jan. 26, Wednesday: Critique mixed media. Here is some time to work on the essay.

Jan. 27, Thursday: Essay due before Midnight in Canyas.

Jan. 28, Friday: Charles Reid figure painting, Janet Rogers portrait painting, and Susan Bourdet cat and garden painting dvds. Figure, animal, or portrait paintings.

### Week 5:

Jan. 31, Monday: Figure or portrait paintings continued. Susana Winton DVD.

Feb. 1, Tuesday: Final projects begin.

Feb. 2, Wednesday: Final projects completed
