### Course Description

This course provides the basic knowledge to understand the operation, configuration, and installation of the various types of wireless telecommunications control equipment commonly used in residential, commercial, or industrial applications. Introduction and review of common test and troubleshooting equipment. Emphasizes NEC requirements in building and electrical codes. (Non transferable, AA/AS degree only.)

6. Identify the different types of transmitters required for optimal installations

8. Troubleshoot and repair various types of wireless systems

Teaching Methods: Discussion of assignments and instructional methods will be a combination of all methods of instruction, which can be classified as telling, lecturing, or discussing; showing or demonstrating.

Out of Class Assignments: The Department of Education policy states that one (1) credit hour is the amount of student work that reasonably approximates not less than one hour of class time and two (2) hours of out-of-class time per week over the span of a semester. **Course Grading Based on Course Objectives**

Late Assignments will be accepted until the graded assignment is returned to the class, but assessed a penalty of 10 points per calendar day it is late.

### Attendance
