Course Description

This course is designed to prepare students with the language skills in reading, writing and comprehension to pass the USCIS (United States Citizenship and Immigration Services) naturalization exam. Students will be provided with English grammar pronunciation, vocabulary development and basic reading skills. The focus of the instruction will be on the concepts of democracy and the rights and responsibilities of citizenship. (Nontransferable, nondegree applicable)

Upon course completion, the successful student will have acquired new skills, knowledge, and or attitudes as demonstrated by being able to:

- 1. Read and write simple sentences as used by USCIS for citizenship applications
- 2. Complete citizenship application form

Course Objectives

Upon satisfactory completion of the course, students will be able to:

- 1. Learn about U.S. history and government by using the USCIS study guide and self-test
- 2. Fill out simple forms requesting personal information
- 3. Read sentences targeting difficult words from the USCIS study guide and vocabulary list for the reading test
- 4. Write a dictated sentence using the sample sentence provided by USCIS
- 5. Focus on the concepts of democracy and the rights of and responsibilities of citizenship

Students will prepare to pass the USCIS citizenship examination.



Textbooks & Other Resources or Links

No textbook is required for this class. Materials will consist of the self study guide, flash cards and other materials provided by the USCIS to prepare the students to pass the citizenship test.

Course Requirements and Instructional Methods

This course will develop students' ability to read and write sentences using vocabulary, and to fill out forms requesting information, especially the citizenship application N-400. Instruction may consist of lectures, activities, discussions, group activities, demonstrations, and more.

Course Policies

Nobody is perfect, and nobody in the class should feel scared or embarrassed about making mistakes. They are a part of learning! I expect all students to be treated with respect. If someone disagrees with an opinion, it is not an opportunity for name-calling or belittling. It is a time to respectfully listen, contemplate, and learn. We do not have to agree in the discussion boards, but we do have to be respectful and kind. Any instances of disrespect in a discussion or group collaboration should be brought to the instructor's attention and may result in the disrespectful student losing points or being reported to the campus disciplinary officer.
- **Plagiarism and Academic Honesty Policy:** Because I want to ensure that you are practicing and learning in this class, I take plagiarism pretty seriously. Plagiarism happens when you copy words or



ideas from somewhere else and submit it or repeat it as your own work. We get better at what we practice, and when we copy, we only get better at copying, not the important English skills we should be practicing. Plagiarism is academic dishonesty and is a very serious problem. Plagiarism includes:

- copying and pasting information from webpages (this includes using the internet for support and using ideas, sentences, summaries, etc. without credit);
- copying answers from an answer key or Teacher's book;
- o copying the work from another student in your class, in another class, or from a previous term;
- copying information from a webpage or book in Spanish and submitting the English translation as your work.
