Course Description

This course focuses on the care of clients across the lifespan experiencing cognitive, mental, and behavioral disorders. Emphasis is placed on management of clients facing emotional and psychological stressors as well as promoting and maintaining the mental health of individuals and families. Concepts of crisis intervention, therapeutic communication, anger management, and coping skills are integrated throughout the course. The community as a site for care and support services is addressed. Clinical experiences provide the student an opportunity to apply theoretical concepts and implement safe client care to clients in selected mental health settings. Clinical experience may be out of county. (CSU)

Student Learning Outcomes

Upon course completion, the successful student will have acquired new skills, knowledge, and or attitudes as demonstrated by being able to:

- 1. Determine actual and potential psychiatric problems and appropriate nursing responses to restore and promote health.
- 2. Identify the commonly used psychopharmacological agents for treatment of clients in mental health facilities and nursing measures needed when administering these treatments.
- 3. Assess a set of clinical data, formulate a nursing diagnosis, implement a plan, and evaluate outcome of the action plan.

Course Objectives

Upon satisfactory completion of the course, students will be able to:

- 1. Perform a mental behavioral health assessment on clients with common mental health disorders.
- 2. Develop an individualized, evidence based plan of care that demonstrates an appreciation of a client's cultural, spiritual, and developmental variations and includes recommendations for the adoption of health-promoting behaviors.



- 3. Collaborate as a member of the health care team and client advocate while providing safe, quality care to clients with common mental health disorders.
- 4. Demonstrate clinical judgment and participate in the evaluation of outcomes when providing care to clients with common mental health disorders.
- 5. Apply knowledge of pharmacology, nutrition, and psychopathology as well as evidence-based practice to the care of clients with common mental health disorders.
- 6. Use therapeutic verbal and nonverbal communication that promotes therapeutic relationships with clients and their families, as well as professional relationships with members of the health care team.
- 7. Use information technologies to access evidence-based literature and client information as well as communicate with members of the health care team, accurately documenting client care in a secure and timely manner.
- 8. Identify, plan, and provide health and safety related education to adult clients and their families in conjunction with members of the health care team.
- 9. Use organizational and priority setting skills when providing care to clients with common mental health disorders in selected settings.
- 10. Report concerns related to client safety and the delivery of quality care and participate in activities that promote performance improvement.
- 11. Adhere to ethical, legal and professional standards while maintaining accountability and responsibility for the care provided to mental health clients and their families.

Course Requirements and Instructional Methods

Program Grading

The ADN/RN Program complies with the Imperial Valley College grading policies in the current catalog and the ADN/RN program grading policy as outlined.

1. All assignments are graded on the following scale and grades are not rounded.

A = 93-100%

B = 85-92%

C = 78-84%

F = Below 78%

Grades will not be "rounded"

F = When the clinical evaluation is unsatisfactory regardless of the theory grade.

The final examination must be passed with a 78% or a grade of "F" for the course will be issued in conjunction with the ADN student handbook.

The student is responsible for making an appointment with their instructor any time their grade average drops below 78%.

- 2. All the following must be attained to successfully pass this course:
 - a. Final Theory Exam score must be passed at a 78%.
 - b. Clinical grade must total equivalent of 78% or greater based on all points accumulated.
 - c. Theory (exams) grade must total equivalent of 78% or greater.
 - d. Dosage Calculation quiz must be passed with a 92% on the first attempt (if applicable).
 - e. Attendance requirements as noted below must be met.
 - f. Less than 3 unsatisfactory in clinical work must occur.
 - g. Final clinical evaluation must show all categories as "Adequate" or "Satisfactory
- 3. Final Course Grades must be 78% ('C') or better, based on ALL the following:
 - a. All finals will be passed with a score of 78% or better
 - b. The theory portion must be passed with a score of 78% or better
 - c. The clinical portion must be passed with a score of 78% or better (satisfactory)
- **4.** Clinical evaluation: Clinical evaluation will be done on an ongoing basis with a student required to meet "adequate" or "satisfactory" in all areas to pass the course. Evaluation is based on written assignments, adherence to nursing standards of care, QSEN competencies, and professional performance. An unsatisfactory in clinical may be given based on the same standards of care and professional performance and will require remediation in the learning center.

Three unsatisfactory grades given in clinical or failure to meet the clinical objectives will result in failure of this class regardless of the overall grade.

5. ATI testing: Students are responsible for reading all material in the ATI book prior to the assigned test date

6. <u>Honorlock</u> will proctor your exams this semester. Honorlock is an online proctoring service that allows you to take your exam from the comfort of your home. You DO NOT need to create an account or schedule an appointment in advance. Honorlock is available 24/7, and all that is required is a computer, a working webcam/microphone, your ID, and a stable internet connection.



To get started, you will need Google Chrome and download the <u>Honorlock Chrome Extension</u> (Links to an external site.) Links to an external site..

When you are ready to complete your assessment, log into Canvas, go to your course, and click on your exam. Clicking "Launch Proctoring" will begin the Honorlock authentication process, where you will take a picture of yourself, show your ID, and complete a scan of your room. Honorlock will be recording your exam session through your webcam, microphone, and recording your screen. Honorlock also has an integrity algorithm that can detect search-engine use, so please do not attempt to search for answers, even if it's on a secondary device.

Course Policies

- A student who fails to attend the first meeting of a class or does not complete the first mandatory activity of an online class will be dropped by the instructor as of the first official meeting of that class.
- It is the student's responsibility to drop or officially withdraw from the class. See ADN Student Handbook for details.
- Regular attendance in all classes is expected of all students. A student whose continuous, unexcused absence exceed the number of hours the class is scheduled to meet per week may be dropped.
- Absences attributed to the representation of the college at officially approved events (conferences, contests, and fieldtrips) will be counted as 'excused' absences. It is the responsibility of each student to attend all classroom and clinical hours and to contact the instructor(s) before the start of class of any need to be excused from class.
- If a student does not contact the faculty member by the assigned time and is absent, a clinical unsatisfactory for professional behaviors will be given.
- Estudents are expected to attend all classes. Absences are limited 6 hours in the course. A student who reaches the maximum allowable hours of absenteeism or tardiness may be dropped by the instructor. Acceptance of absenteeism excuses is at the discretion of the faculty member and may result in failure of the class. A student who reaches the maximum allowable number of hours absent and is not allowed to continue may file a petition to reenter the nursing program. The teaching team will meet with the student to discuss remediation and the possibility of reentry.
- > Students who are late for class/clinical three times will be considered absent for one day!

We expect each student in this class to respectfully participate. While we enjoy teaching, we hope you have fun in this class, please act professionally and keep other students' feelings in mind and refrain from rude, inappropriate behavior and language in class.
