Course Description

ESL 013 is a listening and speaking course for ESL students who want to develop oral language skills and listening skills at the lowintermediate level. Students learn to exchange information on a variety of common topics, expressing ideas in an extended series of phrases and sentences. Students also increase listening comprehension skills by listening to a variety of academic material. This course may be taken concurrently with other ESL Level 3 courses. Successful completion of this course will prepare students for ESL 014. (CEFR A2) (Nontransferable, nondegree applicable)

Demonstrate knowledge and use of vocabulary to deal with concrete ideas and everyday need
